James Tyrcha transitioned 10 years ago this April, and yet for years after he lived in fear of rejection just for being transgender. Two years ago, that stopped-when he came out to everyone about his transition.
"I just needed to be open about my transition and be an advocate" for the transgender community, said Tyrcha, spurred to speak out by bathroom/locker room use debates for transgender and the hoard of trans-bullying and physical attacks, particularly against trans women.
Flash-forward to the present, and Tyrcha is now an award-winning trans male.
Tyrcha, 39-who grew up in suburban Minooka, now lives in Chicago's Uptown neighborhood and works at Crew Bar \& Grill and Jackhammer-was the winner of the first Mr. Leather 64Ten contest, held in mid-March at Jackhammer (2015 Mr. Leather64Ten Michael Pacas was appointed). Leather-goods retailer Leather64Ten hosted a slew of weekend events around the contest for Chicago's leather community. This was the first contest Tyrcha ever entered, as one of five competitors.
"I was thrilled, flying high. The experience was like no other," said Tyrcha, the founder of the website TransMaleChicago.com. "Being on stage was absolutely overwhelming, an experience that created lifelong companionship, brotherhood.
"It was an unbelievable bond created between us competitors.

Tyrcha admitted he was reluctant to enter the contest, worried about his physique and how it'd compare with/against his opponents.
He said he won the title "because of my passion to change the community and make a difference in the world-and that's what being a title-holder is all about.'

Tyrcha was emotional when asked about the

If ever Pantene revives its "Don't hate me because I'm beautiful" campaign, might I suggest Steve Grand as the new spokesperson? Poor Steve. He's just too pretty for his own good. He's an out-and-proud singer whose campaign to finish his All American Boy album became the fourth-most-funded music project in Kickstarter history.

## Appellation;

I recently went to weekend brunch at Andersonville's Appellation (5212 N. Clark St.; Pasto-ralArtisan.com/appellation)-which I could also seemingly call Pastoral/Appellation, as the 75 seat bistro is an extension of the Pastoral Artisan Cheese, Bread \& Wine business located at the same address.
Something that surprised me was the fact that there weren't too many diners at Appellation at 11 a.m. Maybe people were still adjusting to the recent time change. (I know I've had my struggles.) Hopefully, the place was bustling after I left because the bistro has quite the impressive brunch. Appellation has a wide-ranging selection of dishes (including sweet and savory items as well as sandwiches)-and, much to her credit, the server was candid with me and my dining companion about which dishes worked better than others (which might have saved this write-up from going in a different direction).
To start, she was on the money about trying the

grapefruit mimosa. I'm not a huge fan of grapefruits, but this Ruby Red concoction was refreshing and VERY delicious.
Regarding the culinary fare, we started with arborio rice porridge, accompanied with poached pears and honeycomb brittle. For some reason, this initially gave me pause-but I would return for this dish alone. The dish was almost comforting, with the right amount of sweetness.
For the main dish, my friend had the smoked whitefish tartine with fennel apple salad and pickled mustard seed deviled eggs-which he really liked. I also really liked my selection: grilled hanger steak with sunny eggs, cheddar grits \& kohl-rabi-Brussels sprout slaw (and hanger steak can really trip up some chefs). We concluded things with ricotta fritters with grapefruit curd-a pair of tasty desserts that happened to be the right size.

Appellation (or Pastoral/Appellation) has other items that warrant trying, including cornmeal-and-sage pancakes, the Croque Monsieur and (most grandly) the continental breakfast with Quicke's Devonshire Butter, Crescendo Crescenza, Pio Tosini Proscuitto di Parma served with toasted miche and panettone. Hopefully, there'll also be more people sampling the fare this eatery has to offfer.
