

# FBI: Hate crimes on the rise

New data collected by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) appears to show an increase in bias-motivated crimes—hate crimes—on the basis of sexual orientation in 2008. Crimes on the basis of religious prejudice may also be up sharply, although crimes based on racial prejudice—which still account for more than half of the 7,783 bias-related incidents reported—appeared to decline slightly.

Attached to the findings was an FBI note cautioning against identifying trends from year to year—the data is not collected systematically and can be subjectively reported. Because the number of agencies which voluntarily report to the Bureau changes from year to year, so can the numbers which it compiles in its reports—and the FBI cautioned that the apparent increase might be attributable to more agencies reporting than in previous years.

The data compiled showed an overall 2 per-

cent increase in bias-motivated incidents from 2007 to 2008, nationwide. The number of crime victims—classified as individuals, institutions, and property—was up slightly from 9,535 to 9,691.

The FBI collects data on bias-motivated crimes on the basis of race, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, and disability. Under federal hatecrimes legislation recently signed by President Barack Obama, the bureau will begin to collect statistics on crimes against transgender people.

In Chicago, the FBI reported 31 total incidents: 13 on the basis of race, seven each motivated by anti-gay or anti-religious animus, and four on the basis of ethnicity. Houston, Texas—only slightly smaller than Chicago—reported 28 total incidents; Los Angeles, the next largest U.S. city, reported 168.

The FBI sorts hate-crimes data into three categories: incidents, offenses and victims. Incidents are defined as the overall situation in which one or more legal offense can occur. The

FBI tracks 11 types of potential bias-motivated offenses, including rape, assault, robbery and

The parallel tracking methods also make it difficult to identify trends in the data. For instance, though the number of legal offenses on the basis of anti-gay prejudice were up nearly 11 percent in 2008, the number of discrete incidents appeared to increase only 2.5 percent.

And though the number of racially-motivated offenses declined slightly—by half a percent—the number of incidents rose more than three percent.

Moreover, the numbers are at odds with those released by other organizations which collect this sort of data. Earlier this year, for instance, the Chicago Commission on Human Relations said that it had collected information on 72 hate crimes in Chicago in 2008. And the Center on Halsted's Anti-Violence Project reported 125





## Clinton: U.S. must 'stand against' bias in fighting HIV

U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton said Nov. 30 the U.S. government must "stand against any efforts" to discriminate against the LGBT community worldwide.

The remark came during a ceremony to mark World AIDS Day, which is observed Dec. 1 every year. The ceremony was held at the Eisenhower Executive Office Building, which houses White House administrative offices.

Clinton used the occasion to announce that the International AIDS Society has agreed to hold its 2012 International Conference on AIDS in Washington, D.C.—the first time the preeminent AIDS conference has been held here since

The first International Conference on AIDS was held in 1984 in Atlanta, home of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The conference was held in San Francisco in 1989, but was banned from the United States following that conference, because the U.S. had passed a law prohibiting people with HIV infection from traveling to this country.

Jeffrey Crowley, the openly gay director of the White House Office of National AIDS Policy, said President Obama is "thrilled" the International Conference will be held in Washington in 2012.

Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius said that ending the ban on HIV immigration and enabling the conference to take place in the United States "shows our commit-

ment to fighting this epidemic and the stigma surrounding it."

"Now is the time to redouble our efforts, not just abroad, but here at home, where HIV/AIDS still infects 56,000 and kills 14,000 Americans each year," said Sebelius. "That's why my department is devoting new energy and resources to reduce the spread of HIV, improve treatments for people with AIDS, and eliminate HIV-related health disparities here in the U.S."

President George W. Bush signed legislation in 2008 to end the statutory ban on people with HIV entering the U.S. President Obama on October 30 directed the Department of Health and Human Services to end its long-standing policy of banning people with HIV from the U.S. The new policy will take effect beginning early next year, said Clinton.

At the press event, Eric Goosby, the president's U.S. Global AIDS Coordinator, noted that it has been 20 years since the last International Conference on AIDS was held in the United States in San Francisco.

Sebelius noted that the Obama administration was launching a new HIV education campaignthe first for the United States in 20 years. The new campaign is critical, she said, to address the continued spread of HIV in this country. In 2005, she said, the CDC found that almost half of all African-American gay men in five major U.S. cities are HIV positive.

Clinton noted that discrimination against LGBT people and others have hampered many efforts at HIV outreach and treatment, making the fight against discrimination important to the fight

Discrimination against LGBT people, she said, is "an unacceptable step backwards" in the fight for human rights generally "and undermines the effect of efforts to fight disease worldwide."

## Minn. lesbians to mark 30 years

Karen Thompson and Sharon Kowalski—a St. Cloud, Minn., lesbian couple—will mark their 30th anniversary with a Dec. 5 event in the in Atwood Memorial Center's Cascade Room at St. Cloud State University, according to a press re-

Kowalski and Thompson lived as a couple for four years when Kowalski was struck by a drunk driver and sustained a traumatic brain injury. Kowalski's parents then learned of their daughter's relationship with Thompson—and Kowalski's father assumed guardianship of his 27-yearold daughter, despite her requests to be placed in Karen's care. Kowalski's father moved her to

a nursing home 200 miles away from Thompson, who was denied visitation rights.

With the support of several LGBT rights, women's rights and disability-rights groups, Thompson began an almost-decade-long legal battle to bring Thompson home, in a groundbreaking situation. In 1993, Kowalski returned home with Thompson.

## Forum held on Hunters' **ID** policy

The T-Storm Coalition for Gender Justice organized a forum Nov. 23 to discuss the new door policy at Hunters Nightclub in Elk Grove Village that supposedly targets transgender individuals.

Prominent figures and concerned citizens in both the Chicago trans and greater LGBT community gathered at the Center on Halsted, 3656 N. Halsted, for the discussion, which was moderated by openly gay state Rep. Greg Harris, D-Chicago. Among the topics addressed were the reasons for the change in policy and which laws, if any, defend it.

Hunters' management was invited to the forum but were not present. Instead, they provided a written statement that was read aloud at the meeting. Part of the statement, as follows, addresses the legal aspect of the policy.

"Without our true and steadfast dedication to the laws that govern our industry there would be no place in the northwest suburbs for the LBGTQ community to assemble and enjoy a safe environment," the statement read. "If these laws seem discriminatory, it is not our intention. These laws are in place to stop underage drinking and every retail liquor establishment must follow these laws, not just Hunters. This is NOT Hunters Nightclubs Elk Grove's policy, it is the

Management from local LGBT nightspots Big Chicks and Roscoe's were present at the meeting and addressed this particular point.

"Our concern is, 'Are you over 21?" said Michelle Fire, owner of Big Chicks. "That's the real key. Not what you dress like, not what you look like, not what gender you appear to be. [Trans ID] hasn't been an issue. In the history of the business everybody has always looked different. It's not like there's a cookie-cutter version of any of us, so I think this issue is kind of strange to come up at this point."

In a previous Windy City Times story about the Hunters' ID controversy, manager Peter Landorf said the law is that the look must match the ID. which is an obvious obstacle for any patron who goes out in a look that is not permanent. Landorf also said that issues with sexual solicitation on the Web site Craigslist involving Hunters and indecent exposure prompted the tightening of the

Members of T-Storm and their advisor—Rick Garcia, political policy director of Equality Illinois—as well as Harris were not aware of any law or legal precedent that upholds Hunters right to turn down anyone whose look is not identical to their ID photo. The Human Rights Act, however, is inclusive of the transgender population, stating one cannot take into consideration a person's sexual orientation or gender identity in housing, employment and public accommodations.

"[Equality Illinois is] very concerned that everyone be treated fairly and equitably in the great state of Illinois, nothing more or nothing less," Garcia said. "You can't have a different set of rules for different groups of people. We're committed also to helping business and public accommodations understand what they can and cannot do under the law."

Discussion leaders also felt prostitution was



a separate issue that Hunters is responsible for policing within their establishment. The pressing concern, they said, is that the policy appears to be applied arbitrarily.

On Oct. 23, members of T-Storm and others totaling 40 people attempted to enter Hunters in drag. According to Kate Sosin and other T-Storm organizers, many were let in with looks that didn't match their IDs, although two were turned away in the initial group and a few who tried to get in later in the night reported much later that they had also been denied entry.

One member who was turned away was Aidan Tharp, a 22-year-old grad student who went to Hunters in a dress, a brunette wig, some makeup and a female ID. Tharp says he then changed out of his drag clothes and approached the same doorman who turned him away earlier and at that point was allowed in the club.

"If this is supposed to be a law or standard, it's not being applied consistently," said T-Storm organizer Christina Kahrl.

Many voiced concern over the arbitrary timing of the policy as well. Hunters has existed for 27 years and has served the trans community for much of that time.

"This has been a safe place for us to gather for many, many of those [27] years," said Helena Bushong, T-Storm organizer and transgender health advocate. "Why now? Why now is this policy being instituted, and I might add again, inconsistently? Why is it after 25 years of participating in their business and being a safe place for gender variant people they can't come to us, even today they can't come to us, and talk to


"Hunters Nightclub is one of our bars, and we're invested in it, in keeping it a safe place," Sosin said.

T-Storm and other organizations—including the Gay Liberation Network, Join the Impact-Chicago, The Bilerico Project, Genderqueer Chicago and the Straight and Gay Alliance Ministry—endorse a boycott of Hunters until the club makes a concerted effort to work toward a change in the policy or the way it is currently

Chicago Gender Society (CGS) President Jackie Perry was also at the forum. Hunters has sponsored the CGS float at Chicago's annual pride parade in the past as well as solicited through the organization's newsletter. Perry said she was stunned and disturbed by news of this policy and, consequently, CGS has stopped accepting money and withdrawn all advertising for the nightclub.

T-Storm, Garcia and Harris all encouraged anyone who has felt discriminated against by Hunters to file a complaint with either or both the Illinois and Cook County departments of Human

The meeting ended with Sosin calling for solidarity on the issue and an end to the notion of the "T" in LGBT being silent. Organizers also stressed the importance of reaching out to the "L," "G" and "B" for support if any change is to occur.

## The Rev. Grant Gallup

Pioneering minister the Rev. Grant Gallup passed away Nov. 26 of heart failure. He was 77

According to Louie Crew (queereye4lectionary. blogspot.com), Gallup was a charter member of Integrity's first chapter, in Chicago, and served as chaplain to that chapter. For several years in the 1970s and '80s, Gallup edited Integrity Forum. For many years he was vicar of St. Andrew's on the near West Side of Chicago, and since about 1988 he had been a missioner in Managua, Nicaragua, where he founded Casa Maria.

Gallup wrote frequently for The Witness and other progressive journals.

In 1976 he was president of the Episcopal liturgists association. His liturgical reflections, Homily Grits (2000-2007; andromeda.rutgers. edu/~lcrew/homilygrits/index.html) remains very popular.

Gallup was known affectionately by his close friends as Sister Mary Rattle Beads, and rattle them he did. He was one of the first out priests in the USA, speaking on the Studs Terkel radio program.

Crew added, "I remember asking Grant how those at St. Andrew's were dealing with his openness. [Gallup said,] 'The same way I deal with theirs.' When someone's son was arrested for using crack, Grant was there to help the family cope. When someone needed groceries to make it to the end of the month, Grant was there for them. His larder was never empty. On some days half the block seemed to show up in his dining room for a meal. He had the gift of endless, joyful hospitality. He kept polished the silverware.

Few people have influenced me as much as Grant. I loved him dearly. He taught me much about justice and about courage. He was a strong

friend when I had few. He constantly pointed me to gospel imperatives. He eschewed pettiness."

## **Eddie Smith**

Eddie Mikel Smith, for years a familiar figure to late-night patrons of North Halsted Street's gay-bar scene, died suddenly Nov. 17. He was 52

Smith worked for Little Jim's, North Halsted's oldest gay bar, for more than 15 years, greeting patrons at the door, keeping a watchful eye on the streets outside and helping more than a few late-night customers find a safe way home.

"He was a very generous and giving person," said Barry Allen, Smith's longtime friend and roommate. "I don't think anybody ever had anything bad to say about him."

In recent years, Smith worked the busy weekend nights at Little Jim's door.

"He really knew how to handle people," Allen said. "And he had a wonderful sense of humor."

Smith also was known to his friends for his love of cooking and sharing food; his potato salad was a staple of Little Jim's anniversary

"When I walked in today, I was just thinking about all the things I would depend on him for, stuff I wouldn't even give a second thought to because I knew Mikel would take care of it," said Little Jim's manager Jeff Morgan. "I can't replace him. He was just a really great quy."

Smith grew up in Bridgeport but had lived much of his adult life on the North Side.

He is survived by his mother, Flora Manning; sisters Janel Smith, Judy Manning and Kristie Manning; brothers Bruce, Carl and Vernon Smith; and numerous nieces and nephews. One sister, Andra Manning, preceded Smith in death.

In accordance with Smith's wishes, no funeral service was scheduled.

incidents of anti-gay crime alone in 2008.

The Commission on Human Relation's data is collected through the Chicago Police Department; and the COH program is part of the National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs (NCAVP). In a press release earlier this year, the NCAVP said that the reason for the discrepancy between its data and the FBI's was that the FBI relies on local law enforcement agencies only, while the NCAVP looks at victim service organization data.

Rick Garcia, director of public policy for Equality Illinois, said that the FBI numbers were underreported. "Oftentimes," Garcia said, "victims of hate crimes are reluctant to report it. ... It's embarrassing and you don't want people to know"—particularly when that means coming out to family, for instance, to whom a victim is not out.

He also said that certain jurisdictions—he used locales in southern Illinois as an example—can also be "lax" about reporting hate crimes. Those crimes, then, are doubly underreported. "Whenever I see hate-crime statistics," Garcia said, "[I] multiply it by 10."

"It's extremely important for these numbers to be collected," he said, "but the reality is

that hate crimes are underreported."

Bill Dobbs, a longtime gay activist and civil libertarian, downplayed the usefulness of hate crimes statistics. "These are crime incident statistics," said Dobbs, who is based in New York City. "And what crime incident statistics do is that they activate very deep emotions in people."

Dobbs said that reports like the FBI's contain "raw crime statistics" that don't take into account the entirety of the legal process that follows the alleged crime. "Was there a police investigation? Was there an indictment?" Removing the crimes from their contexts, Dobbs said, "feeds a climate of anxiety about crime."

In terms of the broader community response to hate crimes, Dobbs criticized the emphasis on enhanced criminal penalties supported by some LGBT groups, and included in most hatecrimes legislation. (Chicago, for instance, considers hate crime to be a Class 4 felony; statewide, "hate" can be considered an aggravating factor in sentencing.)

"You can't solve a social problem with law and order," he said. "I think we have to start being smarter about this. There's a difference between vengeance and justice."

## **County board** candidates vie for gay vote

Three of the four candidates for Cook County Board president spoke to the LGBTQ community Nov. 29 at a forum hosted by the Social Justice Alliance of Affinity Community Services, which includes Affinity, Coalition for Justice and Respect, Windy City Black LGBT Pride and Youth Pride Services.

Cook County Circuit Court Clerk Dorothy Brown, Chicago Alderman Toni Preckwinkle and Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago President Terrence O'Brien attended. Current Cook County President Todd Stroger was absent, although forum organizers said he was expected to be there. Affinity Executive Director Kim Hunt said she had not received any word from Stroger's office about why he failed to show up as planned.

U.S. Rep. Danny Davis, D-7th, who recently dropped out of the race for county board president, moderated the discussion.

Brown, Preckwinkle and O'Brien answered questions about their views on the controversial Cook County sales tax; funding to treat and prevent sexually transmitted infections (STIs); violence against LGBTQ people; and their goals for their first 90 days in office.

Brown said she would work to "strategically lower the county's sales tax, while replacing it with new revenue and lower expenses." She said hiring collection agencies and entering into advertising contracts might be solutions to gener-

"We will work on finding revenue without raising taxes," Brown said.

Preckwinkle said she also supports an elimination "over time" of Stroger's penny-on-thedollar sales tax increase. She spoke out strongly in favor of making permanent the independent board that was created last year to oversee the Cook County Health & Hospitals System.

"The independent governance board of the healthcare system has already proven itself," Preckwinkle said, pointing to cost savings since the board was created.

O'Brien took a more aggressive stance on the sales tax than his opponents. "The first thing I would do is repeal the 1 percent sales tax increase," he said.

O'Brien said the higher sales tax has driven businesses out of the county and taken jobs away from residents. He also said he would consider alternative sentencing for non-violent offenders like home confinement and electronic monitoring to cut costs and reduce the population at Cook County Jail.

When asked how he'd ensure equitable distribution of funding among Cook County communities to treat and prevent STIs, O'Brien said he would look to organizations like Affinity and AIDS Foundation of Chicago for guidance. "What we need to do in county government is work with community groups," he said.

O'Brien also said he'd work to improve medical bill collections and would pursue state and federal grants for health care.

sources are properly allocated to the communities that need them most." She said she issued her own executive order against discrimination at the clerk's office and pointed out that she has received awards from African-American and LGBTQ community groups.

"I have a history of helping in this area and I will continue to do that," she said.

On the broader issue of county health care, Brown said she would strive to work closely with the Department of Public Health. She also said she would try to increase funding for medical testing, referrals and prevention.

"I'm going to create a grants and research department to make sure we're going after every grant that is available," Brown said.

Preckwinkle said she would emphasize prevention of STIs, particularly in the African-American community. "STIs aren't prevalent in equal proportion among the different ethnic groups in Chicago," she said.

She also applauded Cook County's Ruth M. Rothstein CORE Center, and said she would try to ensure the center continues to receive adequate

All three candidates said they would work to prevent violence against LGBTQ people.

Brown said she would form an advisory committee of community groups to solicit advice on curtailing violence against LGBTQ people. She said hate crimes based on sexual orientation, like domestic violence, can be reduced with edu-

domestic violence—law enforcement didn't take that seriously a few years ago," Brown said.

O'Brien said that first we have to encourage LGBTQ victims to report attacks. "Then we have to work with the State's Attorney to send the message that we will not tolerate hate crimes,"

Preckwinkle similarly emphasized importance of "vigorous" prosecution of hate crimes. But, she added that she would use her post as Cook County board president to raise awareness about violence and discrimination against LGBTQ people.

"The president of the Cook County board should use the position as a pulpit to ... stand up for equality for all of our citizens," she said.

Preckwinkle also said she is the only candidate for county board president who supports the legalization of same-sex marriage. Brown and O'Brien both said they support civil unions.



# A beautiful struggle

For me, growing up as a Puerto Rican woman in Chicago has been bittersweet. In the typical Chicago Latino neighborhood of Humboldt Park, I was definitely odd for a number of reasons. I was not Latina enough because I wasn't born in Puerto Rico, my Casper-like skin tone wasn't dark enough, and I didn't attend my neighborhood school with everyone else.

In the gay community I wasn't gay enough because of my bisexual status. Among my old school Latino family, I was an uncomfortable, crazy and embarrassing topic.

I'm the oldest of 13 grandchildren. I got the message it's all right to be gay, but if it's in your family it's a different story.

My family grew up in neighborhoods where the racial tension between whites and Blacks was violent. There are times when my sister, brother and I sat and listened to my family talk about 1968 and how rough it was to live in what Chicagoans now call Lincoln Park, a gentrified neigh-

borhood.

It shocked me growing up that even though my family faced discrimination, they found it hard to accept my bisexuality. Like no one Latino is qay—ha!

My mother had the hardest time accepting my bisexuality.

"I didn't raise you to be no fucking pata (derogatory for lesbian)! Is that what I send you to an all girl school for?" my mom yelled frequently.

Whenever she said the word "pata," I felt a hole in my soul. I knew she meant it was something dirty, and it was something she was highly embarrassed about. Whenever she was upset with me she always had to throw in the fact that she thought I was weird and of course unacceptable.

She was taught being gay was wrong in God's eyes from a very young age. Did she walk through the Puerto Rican Festival with her eyes closed in Humboldt Park? As the years went on it seemed to become a pre-game party before the annual Chicago Annual Pride Parade. How could she think I was an outcast?

I have the most respect for my abuela (grand-mother). I went to my grandmother with my confusion and pain growing up, hoping for some gentle guidance. I asked her what God might think of me and if she still loved me because I was bisexual. I knew abuela was old school, and no matter how she answered, I would respect whatever she said. It was more important for me to tell her myself, to be brave enough to expose my real self. I wanted her to know all about a

person who is gay without the stereotypical garbage. I'm her first grandchild, the brave one.

"I don't know what to tell you to do mi'ja. I don't have the answer for you. I think God put man and woman on earth to be together, not two women or two men. All I can tell you is to ask God and pray about what you should do. I love you no matter what," she said.

Over the years, I've expressed to my family how much hypocrisy there is in teaching us to accept other people's cultural differences and that God loves us all. How can they not accept our sexual differences?

Over time their attitudes slowly changed.

My dad said, "You know Dad loves you no matter who you love, right, Ely? You know I'd be there if you decided to marry a woman, right? I want you to know I love you and no matter what, nothing will change that."

I've struggled a great deal over the years being myself with my family. It was extremely hard. However, I've also begun a dialogue so that our cultural and sexual differences can walk together across a bridge that leads to unified acceptance and understanding. Differences are what keep this world going.

As a Latina I have a responsibility to speak up for others who can't, especially if they're gay or bisexual. My ancestors have taught me to be strong and lead. Who would I be if I forgot all the parts that make up my pride?

# Stop the slaughter!

Since Matthew Shepard's murder in 1998, there have been over 16,000 hate crimes based on sexual orientation and gender identity. This represents about 1,450 annual sexual orientation and gender identity hate crimes. Last year, 29 gay, lesbian and transgender Americans were victims of hate crime murders.

On Oct. 28, 2009, President Obama signed into law the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd, Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, which among other classifications added sexual orientation and gender identity to the federal hate crimes statute.

While that appeared to be a cause for celebration, it is the beginning, not the end, for America addressing homophobia in its schools, communities and culture. The FBI recently reported that in 2008 hate crimes were up 2 percent over the prior year. Sexual orientation and gender identity hate crimes increased by 11 percent. One in six hate crimes was perpetrated on gay, lesbian and transgender citizens.

That need for a national call to consciousness was underlined Nov. 14 when Jorge Lopez Mercado, a 19-year-old student from Caguas, Puerto Rico was found by the side of the road burned, decapitated and with all limbs dismembered from his torso. This crime would be shocking if it occurred in Baghdad or Kabul and is all the more horrific having occurred in a U.S. territory.

Jorge was a well-liked and openly gay teen. He was active in HIV prevention and gay civil rights. The police have arrested Juan Martinez, a 26-year-old father of four. The LGBT community has called on U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder for a federal investigation and the first prosecution under the Matthew Shepard Act. In 2002, Puerto Rico included sexual orientation in their

hate-crimes statute. Despite hate crimes against LGBT citizens, there have been no prosecutions.

About the same day that Jorge was butchered, James Mattison, Jr., a 15-year-old African American high school student from Baltimore, was found dead. His body was stuffed in a closet. James was a popular, academically gifted and openly gay teen. His dream was to become a pediatrician.

James was found raped and bludgeoned to the head and throat. The accused, Dante Parish, is a 35-year-old with a record of violence.

If there is a cause for optimism, it is that those in the religious community who have marginalized LGBT Americans are becoming less likely to engage in overt homophobia. When religious leaders say that gays and lesbians will not go to heaven or assert that they are anything less than the children of the Almighty, they facilitate emotional and physical harm.

Our public schools need to be safe havens for all students. The pejoratives "faggot" and "that's so gay" are regularly uttered in almost all high schools without sanction.

While mainstream media has made noteworthy strides in the portrayal and coverage of gays and lesbians, there were few news accounts of the gruesome murders of Jorge Lopez Mercado and Jason Mattison, Jr.

If we are to change the dynamic, we must use Jorge and Jason's murders as a call for a national discussion to include LGBT Americans in the pursuit of a more perfect and inclusive America.

Miriam Mercado, Jorge Lopez Mercado's mother, said it best: "When my son told me he was gay, I told him, 'Now, I love you more.' I want to tell the world that hatred is not born with human beings, it is a seed that is planted by adults and is fostered by creating a climate of intolerance and violence. We must change our ways and understand that anyone...could have been my son. And I want everybody to know that Jorge was a very much loved son."

## Banning the ban

"Don't Ask, Don't Tell" (DADT) has right-fully come under attack again. The American Medical Association recently voted to oppose DADT, saying the policy of forcing gay service members to keep their sexual orientation a secret from their physicians has a chilling effect on communication and is a bad law. These conclusions are neither new nor unexpected.

The rationale of prohibiting gays from serving in our military forces has been consistently contradicted by at least three studies commissioned by the U.S. Department of Defense itself. The Crittenden Report (1957) concluded that homosexual service members did not pose a greater security risk than heterosexual personnel. According to the report, intelligence officers sometimes considered heterosexual relations more of a security threat than homosexual conduct.

The prohibition, persecution and prosecution of gays in our military forces are increasingly indefensible in light of a new report by education and military leaders. An alarming 75 percent of Americans ages 17 to 24 would not qualify for military service because they are physically unfit, have criminal records, or have not finished high school.

Of course, DADT is attributable to violence as well, but not only toward gay and lesbian military members. Recently, a Chicago man was charged with murdering his wife. While the crime was portrayed as domestic violence involving insurance money, DADT played a role as well. When the wife reportedly discovered her husband was secretly engaged in MSM activities and threatened divorce, the husband understood that his military career and pension were endangered and chose murder in response.

It's time to end DADT and allow gays and lesbians to openly serve in our military forces

## IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

- You should not take LEXIVA if you have had an allergic reaction to LEXIVA or AGENERASE® (amprenavir).
- High blood sugar, diabetes or worsening of diabetes, and bleeding in hemophiliacs have occurred in some patients taking protease inhibitors.

- When you start taking HIV medicines, your immune system may get stronger and could begin to fight infections that have been hidden in your body, such as pneumonia, herpes virus, or tuberculosis. If you have new symptoms after starting your HIV medicines, be sure to tell your doctor.
- Changes in body fat may occur in some patients taking antiretroviral therapy. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not known at this time.
- Skin rashes can occur in patients taking LEXIVA. Rarely, rashes were severe or life threatening.
- Opportunistic infections can develop when you have HIV and your immune system is weak. It is very important that you see your healthcare provider regularly while you are taking LEXIVA to discuss any side effects or concerns.
- Kidney stones have been reported in patients taking LEXIVA. Tell your healthcare provider if you have pain in your side, blood in your urine, or pain when you urinate.
- Most common side effects in clinical studies were diarrhea, headache, nausea, rash, and vomiting. In most cases, these side effects did not cause people to stop taking their medicine.



### **DRUG INTERACTIONS**

- LEXIVA should not be taken with: AGENERASE® (amprenavir), Halcion® (triazolam), ergot medications (Cafergot®, Migranal®, D.H.E. 45®, and others), Propulsid® (cisapride), Versed® (midazolam), Orap® (pimozide), Zocor® (simvastatin), Mevacor® (lovastatin), Rifadin® (rifampin), Rescriptor® (delavirdine mesylate), or St. John's wort (*Hypericum perforatum*). If you are taking Norvir® (ritonavir), you should not take Tambocor® (flecainide) or Rythmol® (propafenone hydrochloride).
- Serious and/or life-threatening events could occur between LEXIVA and other medications, including Cordarone® (amiodarone), lidocaine (intravenous only), Elavil® (amitriptyline HCl), and Tofranil® (imipramine pamoate), tricyclic antidepressants, and Quinaglute® (quinidine).
- Women who use birth control pills should choose a different kind of birth control. The use of LEXIVA with Norvir (ritonavir) in combination with birth control pills may hurt your liver. Also, birth control pills may not work if you take LEXIVA or LEXIVA with Norvir. Talk to your healthcare provider about choosing the right birth control for you.
- Patients taking Viagra® (sildenafil citrate) or LEVITRA® (vardenafil HCl) with LEXIVA may be at increased risk of side effects.

(fosamprenavir calcium) Tablets and Oral Suspension

Read the Patient Information that comes with LEXIVA before you start taking it and each time you get a refill. There may be new information. This information does not take the place of talking with your healthcare provider about your medical condition or treatment. It is important to remain under a healthcare provider's care while taking LEXIVA. Do not change or stop treatment without first talking with your healthcare provider. Talk to your healthcare provider or pharmacist if you have any questions about LEXIVA.

#### What is the most important information I should know about LEXIVA?

LEXIVA can cause dangerous and life-threatening interactions if taken with certain other medicines. Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

- Some medicines cannot be taken at all with LEXIVA.
- Some medicines will require dose changes if taken with LEXIVA.
- · Some medicines will require close monitoring if you take them with LEXIVA.

Know all the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements, Keep a list of the medicines you take. Show this list to all your healthcare providers and pharmacists anytime you get a new medicine or refill. Your healthcare providers and pharmacists must know all the medicines you take. They will tell you if you can take other medicines with LEXIVA. Do not start any new medicines while you are taking LEXIVA without talking with your healthcare provider or pharmacist. You can ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist for a list of medicines that can interact with LEXIVA.

#### What is LEXIVA?

LEXIVA is a medicine you take by mouth to treat HIV infection. HIV is the virus that causes AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome). LEXIVA belongs to a class of anti-HIV medicines called protease inhibitors. LEXIVA is always used with other anti-HIV medicines. When used in combination therapy, LEXIVA may help lower the amount of HIV found in your blood, raise CD4+ (T) cell counts, and keep your immune system as healthy as possible, so it can help fight infection. However, LEXIVA does not work in all patients with HIV.

- cure HIV infection or AIDS. We do not know if LEXIVA will help you live longer or have fewer of the medical problems (opportunistic infections) that people get with HIV or AIDS. Opportunistic infections are infections that develop because the immune system is weak. Some of these conditions are pneumonia, herpes virus infections, and Mycobacterium avium complex (MAC) infections. It is very important that you see your healthcare provider regularly while you are taking LEXIVA. The long-term effects of LEXIVA are not known.
- lower the risk of passing HIV to other people through sexual contact, sharing needles, or being exposed to your blood. For your health and the health of others, it is important to always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood. Never use or share dirty needles.

LEXIVA has not been fully studied in children under the age of 2 or in adults over the age of 65.

#### Who should not take LEXIVA?

#### Do not take LEXIVA if you:

- are taking certain other medicines. Read the section "What is the most important information I should know about LEXIVA?" Do not take the following medicines\* with LEXIVA. You could develop serious or life-threatening problems.
  - HAI CION® (triazolam: used for insomnia)
  - Ergot medicines: dihydroergotamine, ergonovine, ergotamine, and methylergonovine such as CAFERGOT®,  $\label{eq:migranule} \textbf{MIGRANAL}^{\texttt{@}}, \textbf{D.H.E.}~45^{\texttt{@}}, \textbf{ergotrate}~\textbf{maleate}, \textbf{METHERGINE}^{\texttt{@}}, \textbf{and}~\textbf{others}~\textbf{(used for migraine headaches)}$
  - PROPULSID® (cisapride), used for certain stomach problems
  - VERSED® (midazolam), used for sedation
  - ORAP® (pimozide), used for Tourette's disorder
- are allergic to LEXIVA or any of its ingredients. The active ingredient is fosamprenavir calcium. See the end of this leaflet for a list of all the ingredients in LEXIVA.
- are allergic to AGENERASE (amprenavir).

You should not take AGENERASE (amprenavir) and LEXIVA at the same time.

There are other medicines you should not take if you are taking LEXIVA and NORVIR® (ritonavir) together. You could develop serious or life-threatening problems. Tell your healthcare provider about all medicines you are taking before you begin taking LEXIVA and NORVIR (ritonavir) together.

## What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking LEXIVA?

Before taking LEXIVA, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions including if you:

- are pregnant or planning to become pregnant. It is not known if LEXIVA can harm your unborn baby. You and your healthcare provider will need to decide if LEXIVA is right for you. If you use LEXIVA while you are pregnant, talk to your healthcare provider about how you can be on the Antiretroviral Pregnancy Registry.
- are breastfeeding. You should not breastfeed if you are HIV-positive because of the chance of passing the HIV virus to your baby through your milk. Also, it is not known if LEXIVA can pass into your breast milk and if it can harm your baby. If you are a woman who has or will have a baby, talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby.
- have liver problems. You may be given a lower dose of LEXIVA or LEXIVA may not be right for you.
- · have kidney problems
- have diabetes. You may need dose changes in your insulin or other diabetes medicines.
- have hemophilia
- are allergic to sulfa medicines

 $Before\ taking\ LEXIVA, tell\ your\ health care\ provider\ about\ all\ the\ medicines\ you\ take,\ including\ prescription\ and\ nonprescription$ medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. LEXIVA can cause dangerous and life-threatening interactions if taken with  $certain\ other\ medicines.\ You\ may\ need\ dose\ changes\ in\ some\ of\ your\ medicines\ or\ closer\ monitoring\ with\ some\ medicines$ if you also take LEXIVA (see "What is the most important information I should know about LEXIVA."). Know all the medicines that you take and keep a list of them with you to show healthcare providers and pharmacists

Women who use birth control pills should choose a different kind of contraception. The use of LEXIVA with NORVIR (ritonavir)in combination with birth control pills may be harmful to your liver. The use of LEXIVA with or without NORVIR may decrease the effectiveness of birth control pills. Talk to your healthcare provider about choosing an effective contraceptive

## **How should I take LEXIVA?**

- Take LEXIVA exactly as your healthcare provider prescribed.
- Do not take more or less than your prescribed dose of LEXIVA at any one time. Do not change your dose or stop taking LEXIVA without talking with your healthcare provider
- · You can take LEXIVA Tablets with or without food.
- Adults should take LEXIVA Oral Suspension without food.

- · Pediatric patients should take LEXIVA Oral Suspension with food. If vomiting occurs within 30 minutes after dosing, the dose should be repeated.
- Shake LEXIVA Oral Suspension vigorously before each use.
- When your supply of LEXIVA or other anti-HIV medicine starts to run low, get more from your healthcare provider or pharmacy. The amount of HIV virus in your blood may increase if one or more of the medicines are stopped, even for a
- Stay under the care of a healthcare provider while using LEXIVA.
- It is important that you do not miss any doses. If you miss a dose of LEXIVA by more than 4 hours, wait and take the next dose at the regular time. However, if you miss a dose by fewer than 4 hours, take your missed dose right away. Then take your next dose at the regular time.
- If you take too much LEXIVA, call your healthcare provider or poison control center right away.

#### What should I avoid while taking LEXIVA?

- Do not use certain medicines while you are taking LEXIVA. See "What is the most important information I should know about LEXIVA" and "Who should not take LEXIVA?"
- Do not breastfeed. See "Before taking LEXIVA, tell your healthcare provider". Talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby.
- Avoid doing things that can spread HIV infection since LEXIVA doesn't stop you from passing the HIV infection to others.
- Do not share needles or other injection equipment.
- Do not share personal items that can have blood or body fluids on them, like toothbrushes or razor blades.
- Do not have any kind of sex without protection. Always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood.

#### What are the possible side effects of LEXIVA?

LEXIVA may cause the following side effects:

- skin rash. Skin rashes, some with itching, have happened in patients taking LEXIVA. Swelling of the face, lips, and tongue (angioedema) has also been reported. Tell your healthcare provider if you get a rash or develop facial swelling after starting LEXIVA.
- diabetes and high blood sugar (hyperglycemia). Some patients had diabetes before taking LEXIVA while others did not. Some patients may need changes in their diabetes medicine. Others may need a new diabetes medicine
- increased bleeding problems in some patients with hemophilia.
- worse liver disease. Patients with liver problems, including hepatitis B or C, are more likely to get worse liver disease when they take anti-HIV medicines like LEXIVA.
- changes in blood tests. Some people have changes in blood tests while taking LEXIVA. These include increases seen in liver function tests and blood fat levels, and decreases in white blood cells. Your healthcare provider may do regular blood tests to see if LEXIVA is affecting your body.
- changes in body fat. These changes have happened in patients taking antiretroviral medicines like LEXIVA. The changes may include an increased amount of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around the trunk. Loss of fat from the legs, arms, and face may also happen. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not
- kidney stones have been reported in some patients taking LEXIVA. If you develop signs or symptoms of kidney stones (pain in your side, blood in your urine, pain when you urinate) tell your healthcare provider right away

Common side effects of LEXIVA are nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. Tell your healthcare provider about any side effects that bother you or that won't go away

This list of side effects of LEXIVA is not complete. Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

### How should I store LEXIVA?

- LEXIVA Tablets should be stored at room temperature between 59° and 86°F (15° to 30°C). Keep the container of LEXIVA Tablets tightly closed.
- · LEXIVA Oral Suspension may be stored at room temperature or refrigerated. Refrigeration of LEXIVA Oral Suspension may improve taste for some patients. Do not freeze.
- Keep LEXIVA and all medicines out of the reach of children.
- Do not keep medicine that is out of date or that you no longer need. Be sure that if you throw any medicine away, it is out of the reach of children.

### **General information about LEXIVA**

Medicines are sometimes prescribed for conditions that are not mentioned in patient information leaflets. Do not use LEXIVA for a condition for which it was not prescribed. Do not give LEXIVA to other people, even if they have the same symptoms you have. It may harm them.

This leaflet summarizes the most important information about LEXIVA. If you would like more information, talk with your healthcare provider. You can ask your pharmacist or healthcare provider for information about LEXIVA that is written for health professionals. ## Into the Busch

Charles Busch doesn't willfully intend to mislead audiences. But some people anticipating the legendary playwright/actor/drag artiste's return to Chicago will surely grumble if they spy the publicity shot he provides for the one-night-only show "An Evening with Charles Busch and Julie Halston."

"Unfortunately the only publicity photo we have together is where I'm in drag. I'm afraid it gives the wrong impression," Busch said, confirming that he had no plans to get wigged up for Victory Gardens Theater's Freshly Squeezed series.

Busch "won't be in drag, but I probably will be," joked Halston, Busch's close friend and frequent artistic muse. Halston promised that she'll do all she can on stage to compensate for Busch's lack of big hair and makeup.

This is, shockingly, Halston's very first time performing in Chicago, despite the fact that her husband, Ralph Howard, once worked in the Windy City radio market (or for Busch's Chicago ties of attending Northwestern University and first earning his Equity card at Victory Gardens).

"I've been all over this country, but I've never played Chicago," Halston said, tempering her enthusiasm by saying that she and Busch will only be in town for about 36 hours. "At least 36 hours is better than no hours."

If you're not familiar with Busch and Halston's celebrated place in modern American theater, then rent the 2005 film The Lady in Question Is Charles Busch. This acclaimed documentary by John Catania and Charles D. Ignacio is not only a must for any aspirant drag artists, but for theater fans in general.

Throughout the film, there's amazing video footage that charts the rise of Busch and Hal-

ston from their 1983 friendship as performance art newbies to respected performers and writers.

"It is kind of fun to watch some of that stuff because it was such a wild and heady time and we were just having fun," Halston said. "But it's also so wild to watch because Charles has become a really fantastic playwright and I think we all knew that this guy was onto something."

Both have gone on to have credits on Broadway (Busch's hit 2000 comedy The Tale of the Allergist's Wife; Halston's featured roles in Gypsy, Hairspray and The Women), on TV (Busch's memorable turn as Nat Ginzburg the HBO prison series Oz; Halston as Bitsy Von Muffling in HBO's Sex and the City) and on the Hollywood big screen (both have cameos in the 1993 film Addams Family Values, while Busch's own 2003 screenplay adaptation and starring role in Die, Mommy, Die! remains one of his proudest artistic achievements).






As rival vampires who have catfights throughout history, Busch and Halston were able to channel their love (and lifelong obsession) with old Hollywood films with a distinctly gay camp sensibility.

## Perseus and Medusa: Or It's All Greek to Me!

Great Britain's Christmas pantomimes aren't about Christmas and aren't pantomimes, but they've been a holiday tradition for 150 years. These lavish musical shows often retell familiar tales—Puss-in-Boots, Cinderella, Robin Hoodplaying the boy hero, a character man playing the Grande Dame and planned audience participation in which children of all ages are encouraged to hoot and holler.

In Chicago, the only example of a British panto is Piccolo Theatre's annual holiday show, sometimes an existing British panto and sometimes a new piece created in the traditional style, which is the case this year. This reduction of Greek mythology presents Perseus (the "boy" role) as a young man in an Athens bait shop (and beauty parlor) who learns he's really a prince. When he falls in love with the evil king's daughter, Andromeda, he's sent in quest of the head of a gorgon. With the help of Pegasus and assorted friends (among them the Dame), Perseus saves Andromeda and secures a gorgon (Medusa herself) who turns the evil king to stone for a happy

Old or new, pantos are leavened with rapidfire word play, puns and sometimes-topical bad jokes. This one includes the following exchange: "He's the world's biggest worm," to which the reply is "Who would have thought he could outdo Joe Lieberman?" More typical, however, is the reference to an ancient Greek bridal registry at "Crete and Barrel," or a description of various mythical creatures as "wood nymphs and sea nymphs and nymphomaniacs."

Those cracks notwithstanding, the story and humor mostly are pitched to kids, meaning rug rats as young as four or five. Perseus and Medusa probably isn't a show to see with adult friends unless you're in the mood for outright silliness or a Panto 101 lesson. A panto is best played to an audience of kids who can provide the critical mass necessary to launch the show, something which was missing at the performance I saw. When present, all concerned will have a delightful time.

Piccolo squeezes 13 players onto its tiny but highly colorful stage, and they are deft at the physical business, throw-away jokes and performing the simple, pleasant, too-brief songs by Tyler Beattie. Darcy Elora Hofer's brightly-hued costumes add much fun, looking as if pulled from the Attic (pun). Still, each year I want Piccolo's panto to be bigger and have stronger musical elements and to abandon some of the Brit traditions which don't necessarily make the show better. I'd love to see Piccolo join forces on a panto with Redmoon or with House Theatre of Chicago, our best theater storytellers. These troupes already use many panto techniques and could complement Piccolo's demonstrated ex-

## Cameron Esposito's latest 'Grab'

Cameron Esposito, the rare full-time, out gueer comic currently working in Chicago, has been enjoying a growing popularity with local audiences for the past three years. (In June, she was named one of Windy City Times' 30 under 30.) Having just returned from touring with El Circo Cheapo, the smart, energetic 28-yearold is now doing five to seven shows a week, teaching stand-up to aspiring female comics and working part-time as a nanny.

Her latest accomplishment is a contract with Rooftop Comedy Records. Grab Them Aghast will be recorded live at Lincoln Lodge, 4008 N. Lincoln, Dec. 3-4, and Esposito hopes that the place is packed with fans, old and new. The album is scheduled for a February release and will be available on iTunes.

Esposito is not an Angry Comic; she prefers to shine a light on "the intricacies and interactions of daily life" and her humor is absurdist rather than overtly political. "I think of myself as a slippery activist. You can't necessarily tag

what I'm doing-being present and challenging people's assumptions," she said.

She writes all her own material, drawing on her experiences as a "gay lady" or "queer," stage monikers she chooses over "lesbian," considering that label a bit old-school and perhaps boundary setting. "If you use the term 'lesbian' in a predominantly straight roomand most rooms are predominantly straight—it becomes the focal point," Esposito said. "Some gay comics only work gay rooms. Being part of the mainstream comedy scene, you're in a situation that is mostly heteronormative and mostly men. I need to live in the middle, career-wise."

Esposito grew up in the Chicago suburb of Western Springs in a conservative Catholic family. "I did not get messages of hate or disgust," she said; she simply was unaware of the existence of "gay people." "I dated men because that was what was supposed to happen," Esposito said. "I had dreams about women and really close relationships, but I was not very self-aware and did not see myself for a very long time." In fact, she was quite religious. "I was an outspoken advocate of abstinence," she said with a laugh. "Realizing that I was queer at that point would have been like discovering I was, say, a leprechaun. There were just no examples of this in my life."

It wasn't until she was at Boston College working on a double major in English and theology (with a minor in Faith, Peace and Justice) that Esposito realized she was sexually attracted to women. "The first time I kissed a woman was one of the most pivotal moments of my life," she said.

This year Black Friday, the traditional jumpingoff point for the annual holiday shopping madness was just the beginning of sales on just about everything including DVDs (both "regular" DVDs and the new, supposedly improved Blu-Ray formats). For movie fans of all stripes, especially those of a queer bent, this will prove to be an incentive to stock up on a slew of new titles and perhaps even buy a few as gifts should the spirit of the season truly arrive. A few suggestions from my own shopping list (unless noted, these titles are already in stores or will arrive on Dec. 8):

#### Tis the season

Three holiday-themed movies worth adding to

the collection: Make the Yuletide Gay, though a tad on the thin side, is one of the few queer-themed holiday movies that hasn't made me want to toss my eggnog. Criterion is releasing A Christmas Tale, the superb 2008 drama starring Catherine Deneuve about the holiday gathering of a dysfunctional French family. And Remember the Night, the nearly forgotten 1940 holiday gem with Barbara Stanwyck and Fred MacMurray from Preston Sturges, is finally getting a release via the new DVD on Demand program, thanks to TCM and Universal (and no one tell my husband, who has had this on his wish list for decades).

#### Classics

The joint TCM/Universal DVD on Demand program has also just given us the **Universal Cult Horror Collection**, a nifty set of five horror programmers with stars Lionel Atwill, George Zucco and others (and look for a set of early Cary Grant films in early January with more titles appearing quarterly). MGM is getting in on the DVD on

Demand action beginning on Dec. 15 with several recent titles and two older favorites: 1962's **Two for the Seesaw** with Shirley MacLaine and Robert Mitchum and 1956's **Trapeze** with Burt Lancaster and Tony Curtis fighting over Gina Lollobrigida.

Universal also recently released the three-disc Claudette Colbert Collection, which includes six hidden gems of one of Hollywood's unsung (and rumored Sapphic) classic stars. And Warner Home Video has superb new additions (in both DVD and Blu Ray formats) celebrating the 70th anniversary of Gone with the Wind and The Wizard of Oz as well as a 50th-anniversary edition of North By Northwest—all with hours of extras including feature length documentaries, etc. in sparkling new digitally improved formats.

#### Recently in theaters

Bruno, the latest from shock character comedian Sacha Baron Cohen—that includes a batch of deleted scenes and other extras, is at the top of my comedies list. Julie & Julia—the delightful dual biopic of blogger Julie Powell and leqendary French chef Julia Child with a star turn by Meryl Streep and a delightful performance by Amy Adams in the title roles—is first on my partner's wish list, next to mine for 500 Days of Summer, the witty romantic comedy with Joseph Gordon-Levitt and Zooey Deschanel, one of the year's best films. It arrives on Dec. 22 just in time to stick under the tree—as does Mike Judge's very funny comedy, Extract, with Justin Bateman, which hopefully will find a larger audience on DVD than it did in theaters.

I have several blockbuster action fans on my list so I'm picking up several of last summer's biggest hits, now hitting stores—**Star Trek** for my best friend (a dedicated Trekkie for 30

years), Terminator Salvation for that cousin on my list who has a thing for Christian Bale, Public Enemies for myself and anyone else who wants a large dose of Johnny Depp until Alice in Wonderland arrives this spring (and maybe Dark Shadows in 2011?) and Inglorious Basterds for that friend (and you know who you are) with the twisted sense of humor (arriving Dec. 15). My partner's son-in-law wants the Watchman Ultimate Box Set and, though I thought everything about it (except Billy Crudup's blue penis) was a waste of time, his wish is my command. My two favorite blockbusters from last summer are going into my collection: Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince (the two-disc edition with all the behind-the-scenes features) and District Nine (which squeaks under the Christmas-giving wire with a Dec. 22 release date).

#### Going green

**Earth**, the stunning documentary from Disney, won't break the bank and **Water Life**, a fascinating six-part documentary (available in a threedisc Blu-Ray version) from Anamorphic is a great companion set. I'm also a big fan of the trend—started by several of the indie distributors—of releasing DVDs in recycled packaging—a trend that hopefully will spread to the majors.

#### Queer-themed


There's plenty out there just for Our People (most of it in the romance or sex comedy department) starting with Zeitgeist's wonderful documentary Chris & Don: A Love Story and Ang Lee's underrated dramedy Taking Woodstock (arriving Dec. 15). Several other interesting LGBT-themed titles: Hollywood Je T'aime, a sexy romantic comedy with Chad Allen and French hottie Eric Debets (from Wolfe Video), the rough-and-tumble **Shank** and Redwoods, a gay romance (both from TLA), Ghosted, a lesbian romantic mystery from First Run Features and Lucky Bastard, a sexy drama from Breaking Glass. And don't forget to pick up Eating Out: All You Can Eat from Ariztical to get your holiday quota of hunky near-naked studs tossed in with the comedy.

### TV time

There's more queer-themed material (lots of it) when my list veers toward the small screen starting with the sixth and final season of The L Word, the latest seasons of Ugly Betty, Desperate Housewives and Brothers & Sisters (each featuring gay characters), Showtime's season three of The Tudors with queer fave Johnathan Rhys-Myers in the title role lands on Dec. 15 and just after the holidays (on Dec. 29) comes Glee, Vol. One: Road to Sectionals, which includes the first 13 episodes of the hit Fox dramedy—something to use one of your gift cards on!

The reason he doesn't look familiar to you is because he's done straight porn. Yes, believe it or not, some people watch straight porn. He







# Wendy Williams keeps it real BY ANDREW DAVIS

This year, a self-described "messy" bombshell hit the television talk-show circuit—and her name is Wendy Williams. (By the way, her fans will be thrilled to know that The Wendy Williams Show—with the host saying her signature line, "How you doin'?"—has been extended through the 2011-12 season.) In a candid interview with Windy City Times, Williams talked about everything from her recent induction in Chicago's National Radio Hall of Fame to why many gay people love her.

Windy City Times: How are you doing, Wendy?

Wendy Williams: How you doin', Andrew?

WCT: [Laughs.] You know, it's a little surreal right now. I'm talking with you and, yet, I'm also watching your show.

WW: Isn't that weird? Yes, it's a Friday, and we're live from New York Monday through Thursday; the Friday show is taped Thursday afternoon at about 1:30. So on a Friday recently I walked into a place for breakfast—and there I was on TV in the bar area. It was weird, you know?

#### WCT: I have to say that you're really rocking that dress.

WW: Oh, the pink one? Thank you! It's Robert Rodriguez. And you know what? When I saw Chris Brown's video, I said, "Oh, my gosh. Cassie [the female singer in the video] is wearing a similar dress to what I have on." And her hair is pushed to the side, the way mine is. [Note: Singer Chris Brown was Williams' guest this particular day.] I had no idea, but there I am!

#### WCT: What was it like interviewing Chris Brown? Did you have any preconceived notions going in?

WW: No, because I had met him before—maybe twice, at the most. I didn't have any preconceived notions. The first time I met him I thought, "Here is a young boy with a whole lot of talent: the singing, the dancing, the charm, the charisma." He's one of the rare young men in R&B and hip-hop who's over 4'2" and he has a nice smile. I was very disappointed to hear about what happened back in February [when he assaulted his then-girlfriend, singer Rihanna], but I had no preconceived notions. I watched the video and had some conversation with him.

#### WCT: It seems like you're getting increasingly comfortable with your show. Do you feel you've made it as a TV host?

WW: No. [Laughs] I don't like to be presumptuous, but I thought I had at least the [moxie] to get off the starting block. I've always had some sort of interest in having my own daytime talk show. That interest does not come without totally focusing on [aspects] like what types of guests I wanted and how I would act. This whole process is a culmination of my wildest dreams come true. I know it's more exciting to say, "One year ago, I was a nurse on the eighth floor of a hospital..." I've prepared all my life for this mo-

WCT: Something I like about you is that you're enjoyably over the top but you also keep it real. You remind me a lot of Dolly Parton in that way—and it was pretty fitting that you dressed as her for your Halloween show.

WW: [Giggles] I love Dolly and I love that comparison. I take that as the highest honor for you to read through all the people you could compare me to and pick this woman because of the audacity she has to be herself. That is the highest compliment. Thank you.

WCT: Last night on The Jay Leno Show, she was asked, "What's the first thing you do in the morning?" She said, "I put my dress on and go home."

WW: [Laughs] Oooh—the sloppy, messy answer! I love it!

WCT: I don't know if you recall this, but on an episode [in August] you were talking with

this woman in the audience who was talking about her battles with food and weight, and you started crying.

WW: I'm such a crybaby. I don't recall that, but so many women identified with me. Maybe I haven't gone through it, but they're comfortable asking me something. Or maybe they've heard

me mention something, like weight. Again, I can be nothing but flattered.

I just love this whole talk-show world that's been created for me (with this supportive staff) and by me, because I'm not scared to be myself. The idea that, in one hour, we can go from hot topics to celebrities—today I'm talking with Chris Brown and the fabulously legendary Diahann Carroll, in a short tank dress with sweaty armpits [Interviewer laughs.]—to our "Ask Wendy" segment... I love this show. It's fabulous—and I can do it all in five-inch heels. [Both laugh.]

#### WCT: Why do you think you resonate with so many members of the gay community?

WW: Probably because we share [the fact] that we're not like the rest—from the beginning. There's having a surprise to pop on the world; for me, it was, "Guess what, world? I'm not perfect. I am who I am. I'm taller and bawdierand I'm not going to do anything about it. I'm not going to fit into your perfect little box." With a gay man or woman, it's, "Guess what, world? I am who I am, and there's nothing you can do about it."

Then, there's also the obvious: I'm brighter than the girl next door. [I like] my pink, my hair is too high, my boobs are too big, my hips come out too much, my heels are too high, my

voice is too loud and my laugh is over the top. I laugh from my feet, and the laughter and joy ring through my 40-inch legs, wrap around my 30-inch waist, pass through my double-F boobs and out of my mouth. And you see all my big teeth—and it is what it is. [Both laugh.]

WCT: By the way, I have to congratulate you on being inducted into the National Radio Hall of Fame [in Chicago in November]. I was looking at the list of previous inductees: Dick Clark, Abbott & Costello, Yvonne Daniels, Groucho Marx and Wolfman Jack are just a few of them. How does it feel to be included with them?

WW: It feels groundbreaking and it feels fabulous. I feel deserving, though; I'm rolling with the big boys—and the legendary big boys, at that. It feels just great.

After 25 years of being in radio, and to still be young enough to matter—I'm not dead or irrelevant—feels wonderful. This is the real deal.

I have been called legendary before [both laugh] but this is truly LEGENDARY. My [descendants] will be able to walk in and see crazy Miss Wendy.

has been opened to an LGBT organization.

Cleveland's on-site crew in Cologne numbered 20, including a representative from Continental Airlines, which already has agreed to be a corporate sponsor in 2014.

"Our message was, 'Come to Cleveland; it's accessible, it's affordable; it's welcoming," Anderson said. "One of the things that we knew was going to be our strength was our financial package. The Cleveland Synergy Foundation had been granted \$700,000 and a minimum of \$1.3 million in in-kind donations [done in goods and services rather than cash] from the City of Cleveland to host the 2014 Games.

"We knew that we had far exceeded the minimum expectations for the venues for the athletic and cultural events. But we also knew that we were at a disadvantage because Boston and D.C. each had representatives in the Federation, so we had to stress that our message was change.

"Cleveland is a melting pot; we have people living here from all over the world. And Cleveland is a fun city."

And when Oosterberg announced Cleveland's name, Anderson admitted he was "floored."

"We thought in our hearts that we had won, but in our heads that we had lost," he admitted. "We knew we would have some battles to entice voters to vote for Cleveland. Eventually, we won the vast majority of the voting delegates, and that was a huge message from the Federation delegates, specifically, the Europeans.

"We were completely nervous when the announcement was being made, but that quickly turned to pandemonium. It was phenomenal."

The Cleveland representatives returned home for a congratulatory party with the city's mayor, other politicians and more.

But Cleveland? Yes, Cleveland!

"Before you can pass judgment on anything, you either need to taste it, look at it, partake in it or participate in it. So before you ever say anything [negative about Cleveland], come to Cleveland, and see what the city is all about. Cleveland is a city that is blazing with innovation, blazing with change, blazing with vitality," Anderson said.

The 2014 Gay Games will be the largest event/ conference in the city's history.

"I could easily list the reasons why people should come to Cleveland. As for those who are negative [toward] Cleveland, well, that's just the nature of the beast," Anderson said.

Anderson, originally from central Pennsylvania, lived in Cleveland in the '80s and '90s, then in California and Arizona. With his partner of 15 years, Jeff Axberg, they returned to Cleveland in December 2006 "and we fell in love with the

Anderson has for years played in gay volleyball tournaments—in Cleveland and elsewhere in North America. "That was an important part of my life and I developed some great friendships," through gay volleyball, he said.

And when he returned to Cleveland a few years ago, he resumed playing volleyball—and he found friends he knew 30 years earlier.

The Cleveland gay volleyball league, the North Coast Athletics Volleyball (NCAV), has grown tenfold in recent years, to more than 400 participants. NCAV is an active affiliate of the Cleveland Synergy Foundation.

Ironically, those 2014 Games almost went to Orlando.

You see, a few years ago, Anderson was contacted by officials with Orlando's Gay Days to see if he was interested in developing the first LGBT Sports Festival at the Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando, which would include volleyball, softball, tennis and a 5K run. Then Orlando officials thought they could host the Gay Games, and Anderson was asked if he would be interested in submitting a letter of intent for Orlando for 2014, and that's what he originally did.

But, when he returned home to Cleveland, "I just thought, 'Why Orlando? Why not Cleveland!' After all, Cleveland has great venues, a great lake, a great community—so why am I doing it for Orlando?"

Cleveland eventually expanded to incorporate nearby Akron.

"Every year up until 2014, we will host an annual My Games Rock Sports Festival," Anderson said. "[Starting] in April 2010, [the event] will include volleyball, swimming and diving, racquetball and squash—and also rugby, soccer or flag football. It will be at Cleveland State University, and this was something we were going to do regardless if we won [the 2014 Games.]"

Ultimately, every 2014 Gay Games sport will have a dry run of sorts in Cleveland, "so we will know what we will have to do, what we will have to change, what we will enhance upon," for the 2014 Games, Anderson said.

There also will be four LGBT cultural events happening annually until 2014.

"Since being awarded the Games, Cleveland has [received requests] from international athletic and cultural organizations to host their conferences, their national championships," Anderson said. "That will really give Cleveland huge exposure over the next five years in a multitude of sports.

"We're going to make sure that when 2014 rolls around, at Browns Stadium for the opening and closing ceremony, it will be the most spectacular opening and closing ceremonies that the Federation has ever seen."

Anderson spoke on several other Gay Games

-Registration: The fee is \$135, regardless of when you register. Most major sporting events have a lower fee to register early, and then the price increases the closer the event gets. "Ultimately, we had \$4.5 million worth of support to do this event," Anderson said. "Our budget for corporate fundraising, and fundraising in general, was already covered before we even took one dime through registration."

-Cologne Gay Games in 2010: "We're definitely an advocate for a successful event in Cologne; there's no question about that," said Anderson. "And that's been the case even before we landed the 2014 Games. A successful event in Cologne will help create more energy for 2014. We will help Cologne as much as we can."

-Unique marketing push for 2014: According to Anderson, it was Brazil, "especially since Rio de Janeiro just landed the 2016 Olympics."

-Worldwide economic crisis: "It would cost you twice as much to participate in [the Games in] D.C. or Boston; that's the beauty of Cleveland," Anderson said. "The LGBT community spends money where it wants to, and athletics certainly are on that list [of where they spend their money]. And they will do it here in Cleveland. It's all about affordability, and Cleveland probably is one of the most affordable cities in the U.S.

-World Outgames: "There is a potential that the Outgames won't happen in 2013 because Copenhagen [this past summer] was not a success based on attendance [the number of participants]," Anderson said. "What I would really like to see is communication between the entire GLBT community. If the Gay Games maintains the integrity that it is an athletic event, and enhances the cultural component by maybe doing a [human rights] conference, [as done at the two Outgames,] one that doesn't take away from the athletic component, then you have the best of both worlds. The possibility does exist that [the 2013 Outgames in] Antwerp would not happen. I think the necessary parties [that govern the Gay Games and the World Outgames] should all get together, open up dialogue, be welcoming to each other. We just think it would be better for the entire LGBT community to just have one [major sporting event] every four years, [not two].'

## **Optimism** reigns in Cleveland

They had exactly 1,775 days from the Sept. 29 announcement that Cleveland would host the 2014 Gay Games until that event's opening ceremony Aug. 9. And organizers are already predicting many other incredible, eye-popping numbers for the event, which will carry a registration fee of \$135, regardless of the date. Just consider that there will be:

- -15,000-20,000 participating athletes;
- -4,000-5,000 participants for cultural
- -250,000 attendees over a 10-day span;
- -7,000 rodeo participants, since rodeo will be at the Games for the first time; and

-70,000 attending the opening and closing ceremonies, both to be held at Cleveland Browns Stadium, home of the National Football League franchise, with the Goodyear blimp flying over-

"We absolutely believe that this is going to be one of the greatest events that the Federation [of Gay Games, FGG] has ever had," said Doug Anderson, 54, one of the three co-founders of the Cleveland Synergy Foundation, the Cleveland bid committee that presented its case for 2014 to the FGG in September in Cologne, Germany, site of the 2010 Gay Games.

"If you talk to athletes, for them, it's about their sport, the love of their sport; it's the reason why they do it," Anderson said. "Cleveland might not be the most spectacular city, but it's a city that, come 2014, people from all over the world truly will be welcome, safe and secure. And that's a message that the Federation is sending out, too. Just because a city is high-profile does not mean that hosting a Gay Games will be a financial success, as we've learned."


Cleveland landed the Games away from fellow finalists Boston and Washington, D.C.

There initially were 14 cities worldwide that expressed interest in hosting the 2014 Games. They were then narrowed to four, but Miami ultimately did not meet a deadline to submit its

So, on the final Tuesday in September, with the world watching live via an Internet broadcast, Chicagoan Dick Uyvari, in Cologne, announced that Cleveland was the 2014 winner.

"We knew that our bid was really strong," said Anderson, whose crew delivered a final 45-minute presentation to the FGG, followed by a 30minute question-and-answer session the days before the announcement.

"We went in with a message that we are the heartland and that just expressing interest in hosting the Games has created enormous change in Cleveland-Akron," Anderson said. "We also told that we had secured the incredible Fires-
