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Advocates launch drive for LGBT senior resources

The LGBT-advocacy organizations Pride Action Tank and the OUTAging Committee announced the launch of a comprehensive, three-pronged initiative to bring resources to LGBT seniors on May 21.

The initiative was announced by its principal participants at a press conference at AARP'S Chicago headquarters. The launch comes a year after the OUTAging Conference gathered LGBT- and aging-related concerns from advocates, service providers and community members in May 2017.

Committee members spent a year "sifting through the information" culled from the two-day conference, said Pride Action Tank Executive Director Kim Hunt, who added that cultural competency in senior LGBT issues among service providers and accessibility of safe and affordable housing emerged as the most common concerns.

Given that about 146,000 Chicagoans identify as LGBT—and that only the Town Hall apartment complex in Lake View, with 79 units, is the only development aimed at LGBT seniors—"Addressing the needs of LGBT older adults is not something we cannot just build our way out of," said Hunt.

Three major themes emerged from the data and anecdotes compiled by the project's principals, according to a May 17 press release, among them that there is a general lack of knowledge about how to access support and resources for LGBT seniors; that those LGBT seniors want strong social networks and communities; and lastly that there is a strong need for systematic and institutional reform in Illinois to better get resources in place.

As such, a key recommendation emerging from the study is for a comprehensive LGBT Older Adult Competency Training for state funded project participants and service providers working with older adults.

Cultural competency, said activist Donald Bell at the press conference, should be defined as the mark of "a professional community able to serve us as our true selves."

Indeed, Britta Larson, Center on Halsted's senior services director, said that some 80 percent of LGBT seniors must return to the closet in most assisted living facilities because of harassment, bullying and discrimination from providers and peers.

Advocates must strive to make sure that those seniors can be "out and proud," Larson added.

The initiative's organizers will next hold community meetings mid- to late-summer to get public input on their findings, Hunt said.

The OUTAging Committee includes representatives from AARP, Affinity Community Services, AIDS Foundation of Chicago, Center on Halsted, SAGE (Advocacy & Services for Older Adults) and The Care Plan, as well as a number of community members.

Bell praised the organizations that took a role

in the project, adding, "I am delighted that they have decided to be allies to my community."

Also speaking at the press conference were Chicago Commission on Human Rights Commissioner Mona Noriega; AARP Associate Director for Advocacy and Outreach Terri Worman; and Matthew Vail, a social worker at Rush University Medical Center.

Non-binary support group to meet May 23



Report: Bias hurts LGBTO teens' health

The Human Rights Campaign (HRC) Foundation and the University of Connecticut released the largest-of-its-kind survey ever of more than 12,000 LGBTQ teenagers (ages 13-17, in this case) across the nation—revealing the constant challenges they face at home, at school and in their communities.

The participants took place in the 2017 LGBTQ Health Survey.

HRC and researchers at the University of Connecticut found that:

—Seventy-seven percent of LGBTQ teenagers surveyed report feeling depressed or down over the past week;

-Ninety-five percent of LGBTQ youth report trouble sleeping at night;

-LGBTQ youth of color and transgender teenagers experience unique challenges and elevated stress—only 11 percent of youth of color surveyed believe their racial or ethnic group is regarded positively in the United States, and more than 50 percent of trans and gender expansive youth said they can never use school restrooms that align with their gender identity;

-More than 70 percent report feelings of worthlessness and hopelessness in the past week;

—Only 26 percent say they always feel safe in their school classrooms—and just five percent say all of their teachers and school staff are supportive of LGBTQ people; and

—Sixty-seven percent report that they have heard family members make negative comments about LGBTQ people.

The research also points to some positive trends illuminating the resilience of LGBTQ young people, such as:

-Ninety-one percent of youth report feeling pride in being an LGBTQ person, and 93 percent are proud to be a part of the community; and

—Three out of five LGBTQ students have access to a LGBTQ student club—which has been shown to have a positive impact on the perceptions LGBTO youth have of their school experiences and can provide support to those who may face hostile environments at home or in their communities.

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Unprecedented seven LGBT candidates for governor

Only in recent years, the LGBT community has been able to support one or two openly LGBT candidate for governor.

In 2014, it was two—Mike Michaud in Maine and Heather Mizeur in Maryland—and they lost. In 2016, it was one—Kate Brown in Oregon—and she won. There are currently seven competing in primaries around the country, including an actor in New York, a Congressman in Colorado, a zookeeper in Oklahoma, and the first transgender candidate for governor.

One, Kate Brown in Oregon, is expected to win the Democratic nomination handily this week and win her third term in November. The other six candidates are newcomers on the gubernatorial landscape, all but one are Democrats, and their odds are mixed. Here's a quick primer on who is running, where, and when:

—Oregon, May 15, Kate Brown:

Incumbent Democratic Gov. Kate Brown defeated two opponents in the May 15 primary.

Brown, who is married to a man but identifies as bisexual, was Secretary of State in Oregon before being sworn in as governor when the incumbent resigned in scandal. She's pushed progressive goals on a number of issues, including immigration, access to safe abortions, gun control, and banning "conversion therapy."

Her biggest challenges in seeking re-election are likely to revolve around state laws protecting

immigrants, underfunded state employee pensions, and a controversial tax break she wants to give small businesses. But, as the incumbent, she has the name recognition and a long-standing involvement in state elective politics.

Brown is the first and only openly LGBT person to be elected governor of any state (she was elected to the office in her own right in a 2016 special election). She has won the endorsement of the Human Rights Campaign and a special

"Game Changer" (or high profile) designation from the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund.

"Kate Brown is a champion of equality who has fought for the LGBTQ community throughout her career, helping to improve the lives of countless people," said HRC President Chad Griffin. "As the nation's first openly bisexual governor, Kate Brown has worked tirelessly to make the principles of fairness and equality a priority for Oregon."

—Texas, May 22, Lupe Valdez:

Polls say Texas' incumbent Republican governor is as "safe" as Oregon's Democrat. But Lupe Valdez has a history of beating the worst of odds. She first earned national attention when she became the first lesbian sheriff anywhere in the nation—n Dallas, Texas. Consider that she started life as the eighth child of migrant workers of Mexican descent in San Antonio, and consider that she won election to sheriff four times as a Hispanic lesbian Democrat (the first time was against a highly favored white Republican 30-year male veteran of the sheriff's department), and it's clear that tough odds don't stop Valdez.

As a young person, Valdez worked her way through college, joined the Army, rising to the rank of captain, then joined the U.S. Customs and Border Protection agency and the Department of Homeland Security.

Valdez has a lot going for her in the May 22 run-off seeking the Democratic nomination, even though she's running against the son, Andrew White, of a former Texas governor, Mark White. In the initial primary, Valdez won 43 percent of the vote against White and seven other Democrats, and White earned only 27 percent. Valdez's campaign has already attracted attack ads from Republican incumbent Governor Gregory Abbott, calling her too "liberal" for Texas.

Whoever wins the Democratic nomination has an uphill climb to win the governor's seat. Texas hasn't elected a Democrat for governor since 1990. And Governor Abbott reportedly has a \$40 million war chest.

The Victory Fund has designated Valdez as a "Game Changer" or "high profile" candidate. She's also won the endorsement of the political action committee of Equality Texas and five Texas chapters of Stonewall Democrats. (The Houston GLBT Political Caucus backed White. According to Out-Smart magazine, the group believed White would be a more viable challenger to Republican Abbott in November. And White vowed to "fight hard" for LGBTQ equality.)

According to the Texas Tribune, White has almost \$1 million in his campaign coffers, compared to \$57,000 for Valdez.

-Colorado, June 26, Jared Polis:

Jared Polis is best known to the LGBT community as the most senior of six openly LGBT members of the U.S. House. But he was a bit of a superstar long before that. While in college, he created internet-based companies that he sold when he got out of college for hundreds of millions of dollars. He used his wealth to promote

technology education, improved schools, and renewable energy sources, and to run for political office. He's been in Congress for 10 years and, now, he's pouring \$6 million of his fortune into a bid to become governor of Colorado.

Polis has a tough race on his hands, just trying to secure the Democratic nomination. His chief obstacles are the three other Democrats seeking the nomination and one of them, former state treasurer Cary Kennedy, has been snaring many of his supporters in the pro-education crowd. The most recent poll showed Polis in the lead but Kennedy's second place was within the margin of error. In fact, at a statewide Democratic convention April 14, Kennedy trounced Polis, 62 percent to Polis' 33 percent. The Denver Post suggested that Polis lost a least a few votes at the convention because of his sexual orientation. The paper said some participants in the assembly said they were afraid that Polis' being gay could "make Polis a harder sell to more conservative voters in

-Maryland, June 26, Rich Madaleno:

Rich Madaleno looks like a governor Hollywood might generate: tall, well-groomed, graying hair, rimless eyeglasses, serious listener—he could do well in a young FDR look-a-like competition. And though he is a politician—currently a state senator—his campaign photos and videos are anything but political convention.

In one campaign video, Madaleno sits with spouse Mark Hodge, reading out loud some of the hate-filled tweets they've received since Madaleno announced he was running for governor. "Your sexual radicalism is bad for Maryland" and "Homosexuality and gender identity disorder are preventable and treatable. A very good ex-gay clinic is located in Maryland." They also share a video about their family, which includes two adopted children. Their son, Jackson, age 10, says his family is "not that different" just because his dad is a state senator.

Polls suggest Madaleno has an uphill battle to secure the Democratic nomination in Maryland in a field of seven candidates. Dramatically, one of the frontrunners recently collapsed and died of a heart attack. But Madaleno is still in the single digits behind two better known figures: Rushern Baker, executive of the state's second largest county, and Ben Jealous, former president of the NAACP. And incumbent Republican Governor Larry Hogan looks hard to beat.

—Oklahoma, June 26, Joe Maldonado:

Joe Maldonado is a zookeeper. Since 14, he's been rescuing animals displaced by wild fires and has expanded the practice into the Exotic Animal Memorial Foundation to take in "unwanted" animals, including lions, tigers, and bears. But the business has been cited by the USDA for failure to provide adequate care to the animals, and several animal protection agencies have reported abuses by the facility.

Chicago street renamed in honor of Chuck Renslow

Dozens of community members gathered just outside Full Kit Gear, 5021 N. Clark St., the afternoon of May 19 as a portion of Clark Street was renamed in honor of gay businessman Chuck Renslow, who passed away in June 2017.


Renslow, the proprietor of the former Man's Country bathhouse on the same block, owned a number of businesses and was especially active in Chicago Democratic politics in the 1970s and '80s. He also published GayLife newspaper before that folded in 1986, and founded the annual International Mr. Leather competition, which this year celebrates its 40th anniversary.

Renslow's longtime partner, Ron Ehemann, emceed the brief unveiling ceremony, noting that, while he obviously knew Renslow as a "family man," it was Renslow's spiritual side that for him left behind the most indelible impression.

"On the most intimate level, I knew him as a spiritual person," Ehemann recalled, noting that Renslow's quiding principle was always, 'Do what thou will."

As such, Ehemann awarded the first "How Great Thou Art" awards, intended to recognize exemplary service to the local LGBT community. The 2018 recipients were activist Lori Cannon as well Windy City Times Publisher Tracy Baim, who along with Owen Keehnen authored the Renslow biography Leatherman: The Legend of Chuck Renslow. Ehemann also acknowledged Full Kit Gear's Chip Beam for helping him to organize his affairs and priorities following Renslow's death. The Andersonville Chamber of Commerce and 47th Ward Ald. Ameya Pawar helped to get the street dedi-

Speaking about the impact Renslow's life and career had on the community, Ehemann said, "Chuck belonged to many more people than me."

and wearing six earrings and an eyebrow piercing. His nickname is "Joe Exotic." On his first day as governor, he wants to pardon all people convicted on non-violent marijuana-related crimes. He also echoes some of President Trump's themes: run the government like a business, slash the number of government regulations and agencies, cut taxes –with one major exception: Maldonado wants "open borders."

Maldonado is one of three candidates for the Libertarian Party nomination for governor in Oklahoma. Polls in the state strongly suggest Oklahoma voters will choose a new Republican governor in November to replace Republican Governor Mary Fallin who is term-limited.

—Vermont, Aug. 14, Christine Hallquist:


Various polls say Vermont will retain a Republican governor in the 2018 general election, but Christine Hallquist is one of three candidates seeking the Democratic nomination to run for that office. Even though Vermont is a progressive state in many ways (it was one of the first to approve marriage for same-sex couples), Republican incumbent Governor Phil Scott is a maverick. He signed three bills to reduce the availability of rapid-fire guns in the state, and he's proposed massive cuts in public education funding. Scott

hasn't announced yet but is expected to run. Notably, an incumbent governor has not lost in Vermont since 1962.

Hallquist is making history as the state's first openly transgender candidate for public office. She's a former chief executive of the Vermont Electric Cooperative who was very open with the public about her male-to-female transition in 2015. She's also transitioned from Republican to Democrat. It's a long way to the primary, but

so far, the newspapers and the state Democratic party appear to be warming up to Hallquist as a viable candidate.

—New York, Sept. 13, Cynthia Nixon:

The three latest polls in New York show incumbent Democratic Governor Andrew Cuomo with a double-digit lead over actor-activist Cynthia Nix-

on of "Sex in the City" fame. But the main problem for Nixon, according to one of those polls, is that "only half the electorate knows her."

That's ironic, given she's an Emmy Award-winning actor on the hit HBO series "Sex in the City." The series ended 14 years ago, but Nixon's been busy in films and on stage since then, winning a second Emmy, two Tonys, and a Grammy. And she's gotten very little attention for her years of work promoting better public schools, ousting state legislators who opposed marriage for same-sex couples, and speaking to groups about the importance of screening for breast cancer (she is a survivor).


There is talk that Nixon, if she loses the Democratic primary, will run in November under the Working Families Party banner.

Nixon was born and raised on the Upper West Side of Manhattan, graduated from New York public schools and is now a parent to three children attending public schools and married to education organizer Christine Marinoni.

Nixon's Cynthia for New York campaign has begun to bring up rumors that Governor Cuomo, while running his father Mario Cuomo's successful campaigns for governor in the 1970s, used antigay tactics to defeat his primary opponent, Mayor Ed Koch.

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Gay boxer named grand marshal of 2018 Pride Parade


Orlando "El Fenomeno" Cruz, the first openly gay active professional boxer, is scheduled to serve as grand marshal of the Chicago 49th Annual Pride Parade that will kick off Sunday, June 24, at 12 p.m.

According to a press release, when he came out in 2012, Cruz stated, "I want to be true to myself. I want to be the best role model I can be for kids who might look into boxing as a sport and a professional career. I have and will always be a proud Puerto Rican. I have always been and always will be a proud gay man."

His talents enabled him to represent Puerto Rico at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia, and to win the World Boxing Organization's featherweight title in 2016. He has held four world boxing titles. Cruz currently operates a gym in Puerto Rico where young athletes train to improve and potentially become professional athletes themselves. He will be fighting in the near future again for another world title in boxing.

Also, he was among the first class of inductees into the National Gay and Lesbian Sports Hall of Fame in 2012.

On June 16, the Puerto Rican Cultural Center will honor Cruz as "king" of the Chicago Puerto Rican People's Parade.

Each year, AFC conducts a review of the Medicaid Health Plans available to people living with HIV on each of the operating Illinois Medicaid health plans. While this information is updated regularly via plans and the state, it provides a snapshot at the different general levels of coverage and the particular drugs being offered in each plan.

AFC staff collected the information in April to help people with HIV choose a Medicaid health plan.

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Advocates, health providers laud new **Prep** approval

Local HIV/AIDS advocates and health officials hailed a decision by the Food and Drug Administration approving the use of the oral medication Truvada as a PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) intervention for adolescents.

PrEP has been shown to be over 90 percent effective in preventing new infections for at-risk individuals. Truvada was approved fas PrEP for adult patients in 2012.

The approval was announced May 15 in a statement from Foster City, California-based Gilead Sciences, the drug's manufacturer.

"By expanding the number of at-risk individuals who can consider Truvada as a prevention option, we have taken another important step toward helping to reduce HIV transmission rates and improve public health in the United States," said Andrew Cheng, MD, chief medical officer for Gilead Sciences. "Gilead is committed to addressing unmet needs in HIV prevention and treatment and we look forward to continuing that work with our research and advocacy partners."

According to Gilead, Truvada for PrEP is now

indicated in combination with safer sex practices to reduce the risk of sexually acquired HIV-1 in at-risk adults and adolescents weighing at least 35 kilograms. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, adolescents and young adults comprise about 21 percent of new HIV infections.

AIDS Foundation of Chicago Senior Director of Prevention Advocacy and Gay Men's Health Jim Pickett called the approval "a huge win." He noted that, though providers could previously prescribe Truvada as PrEP for adolescents previously, it was designated as an off-label prescription, which many physicians are reluctant to write. Furthermore, patients frequently had difficulty receiving financial assistance to help pay for Truvada off-label, which is extremely costly.

"The fact that it is now an on-label prescription provides a lot of reassurance," he said.

Pickett further praised the work of the staff at Ruth M. Rothstein CORE Center at Stroger Hospital, which participated in research that ultimately went into the FDA decision, adding, "Now it's up to all of us to make good on it."

Lisa Henry-Reid, MD, who is chair of the di-

vision of adolescent medicine and young adult medicine at Stroger Hospital, acknowledged that getting the word out about PrEP and its potential to help youth would be a challenge, but said the intervention could be an "important part of the toolbox" in preventing new infections among that demographic.

"Our Chicago Department of Public Health and

Illinois Department of Public Health need to be a leader in this effort, in particular for our Chicago Public Schools system, to engage around this message," explained Henry-Reid. "This is really a big deal in terms of prevention."

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




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LGBTQI-inclusive initiatives at Urban Prairie Waldorf School

Urban Prairie Waldorf School, on Chicago's Southwest Side, began more than a decade ago with the goal of educating students from early childhood to eighth grade in the traditional Waldorf model of engaging the whole child intellectually, socially, emotionally and physically.

Waldorf students are encouraged to be curious, compassionate and self-reliant. They also use critical thinking skills in every subject area.

The school has also added LGBTQI-affirming policies in recent years. Sexual orientation non-

discrimination language is featured online and in the print handbook, all faculty and staff have pronouns included on the school's website, a transgender and non-binary students and community members gender affirmation policy has been added in the last year, the school's first-floor bathrooms are gender neutral, LGBTQI history representation is being woven into each grade's curriculum and the 8th grade human fertility class includes LGBTQI human reproduction instruction.

Local intersex advocate and speaker Pigeon Pagonis visited the eighth-grade human-fertility

class to share their experience with the students. Staff has also gone through training with the Illinois Safe Schools Alliance and facilitate Seeking Educational Equity and Diversity (SEED) seminars monthly where they learn about their own implicit bias when creating their curriculum.

On March 31, Urban Prairie held its first school-wide Trans Day of Visibility event. The day was focused on bringing consciousness and visibility to the trans and gender nonconforming community. Each teacher chose activities that were age-appropriate and would meet the developmental needs of his or her students and the righth-grade students volunteered to lead many of the day's activities. Younger children heard gender creative fairytales and stories. One grade had older students role-play how to ask someone about their pronouns in a respectful way. The transgender flag was painted in watercolor by some students while others passed out homemade pins in the colors of the flag.

There was pushback from some parents due to the Trans Day of Visibility event. A few students were kept home that day while some other par-

ents, whose children were at the school that day, told the school afterward they would not be returning for the 2018-19 school year.

Although there was a small percentage of parents who reacted negatively to the Trans Day of Visibility event, the rest of the school community has been supportive.

"Urban Prairie's value of LGBTQI-inclusivity is based in love—a love and appreciation for each child [and parent] who comes to our school," said Urban Prairie Director of Community Development Heather Berhalter. "We strive to be a school that presents 'mirrors' and 'windows' for every child and their experience. A 'window' is an opportunity within the curriculum to see into and value another person's experience. A 'mirror' is a curricular opportunity to have your own existence reflected back to you in a way that is affirming of your humanity. This method seamlessly interweaves love for the other and self worth into our everyday learning in the classroom. When all of the children feel seen, loved and valued, they are available for the real work of school—learning and growing. Our transgender and non-binary students and community members policy gives the structure to support this basic value of our

"The Urban Prairie curriculum is probably one of the most accepting and inclusive environments I have ever experienced," said 8th grade student Siah Berlatsky. "For anybody who is thinking about going to this school, they will have a phenomenal experience. They will be taught to love and respect themselves for who they are."

"It is important that we recognize, honor and accept trans and non-binary people for who they are," said 8th grade student Cecilia Cowen. "Learning more about this community and talking about the issues they face is very helpful for any middle school student."

"Urban Prairie has been the most supportive school I have been a part of," said 8th grade student Elliot Bushell. "I would consider this school



to be a safe space for me. The teachers and community on the whole are very warm and friendly. I do not think I will be able to find a place like Urban Prairie in the future."

"I am excited and happy that the school is striving to be a more inclusive place and that festivals like Trans Day of Visibility allow our students to be more compassionate and understanding," said Movement and Games Teacher and 8th grade math teacher Adriana Kondrat. "It was a bit surprising to see some community members be apprehensive to the festival and the other affirming initiatives that are occurring. As an educator, my highest priority is the safety and well being of the children. When we offer a curriculum that show the breadth and depth of human experiences, we support each student's individuality while developing their capacity to meaningfully engage with the other."

"It is incredible to work in a school with incredible faculty who care so deeply for their students," said 9th grade teacher Meredith Merchant. "It allows the space for developing adolescents to move into their true selves with freedom. Being a teen is hard enough, if we can help clear the path through affirmation and love, then we have done our jobs."

"Having a transgender policy for our school is something I support," said Urban Prairie parent Briana Villarrubia. "In 2016, after a discussion with our pedagogical chair around transgender identity, I offered to have my sister and niece come talk to our faculty, staff and parents about our family's transgender journey. The intention was to support and educate others about transgender issues and start a conversation around acceptance and understanding. Research shows depression and suicides are probable outcomes for transgender individuals. If there is a way to avoid this through education and communication, to encourage acceptance of differences, I am happy to participate and support this conversation.

"I believe the push back in our school around our transgender policy reflects what we see in the world. The Waldorf idea of community and the verse shared at our Parent Council meetings states that, 'A community is healthy only when the whole community takes shape in the mirror of the human soul, and the force of the individual soul lives in the community.' I believe our school wants all people to feel welcome and that our policy is an opportunity to continue a conversation that will strengthen our community and world."

"Our family is very happy with the school," said Urban Prairie parent Sarah Steedman. "The school faculty and staff are progressive and forward thinking in many areas, but particularly of note is they provide a safe place for all students to express their true selves without fear. For the students, this meant receiving age appropriate education on how to be inclusive with everyone in our school community as well as the wider community.

"Our two kids transferred to Urban Prairie from CPS where they were both struggling for different reasons, one with their gender identity and the other academically and socially. They were begging us to find a different kind of school to go to because they were so stressed out. Both of our children are now thriving. I credit a lot of their joy and the rewarding friendships they have found to the exemplary and forward-thinking education they are receiving. The teachers are meeting the challenge of a changing world with grace, compassion and inclusivity toward all."

"We are committed to affirming the identity of all children regardless of age," said special subjects teacher Jillian Miller. "It is our goal to make children, families and staff feel included, celebrated and valued. Each community member should see themselves represented at Urban Prairie Waldorf School."

Brief Summary of Patient Information about BIKTARVY®

BIKTARVY (bik-TAR-vee) (bictegravir, emtricitabine, and tenofovir alafenamide) tablets

Important: Ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist about medicines that should not be taken with BIKTARVY. For more information, see "What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking BIKTARVY?"

What is the most important information I should know about BIKTARVY?

BIKTARVY can cause serious side effects, including:

- Worsening of hepatitis B virus (HBV) infection. If you have an HBV infection and take BIKTARVY, your HBV may get worse (flare-up) if you stop taking BIKTARVY. A "flare-up" is when your HBV infection suddenly returns in a worse way than before.
 - Do not run out of BIKTARVY. Refill your prescription or talk to your healthcare provider before your BIKTARVY is all gone.
 - Do not stop taking BIKTARVY without first talking to your healthcare provider. If you stop taking BIKTARVY, your healthcare provider will need to check your health often and do blood tests regularly for several months to check your HBV infection. Tell your healthcare provider about any new or unusual symptoms you may have after you stop taking BIKTARVY.

What is BIKTARVY?

BIKTARVY is a prescription medicine that is used without other anti-HIV-1 medicines to treat Human Immunodeficiency Virus-1 (HIV-1) in adults:

- who have not received anti-HIV-1 medicines in the past, or
- ▶ to replace their current anti-HIV-1 medicines for people whose healthcare provider determines that they meet certain requirements.

HIV-1 is the virus that causes AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).

BIKTARVY contains the prescription medicines bictegravir, emtricitabine, and tenofovir alafenamide.

It is not known if BIKTARVY is safe and effective in children under 18 years of age.

Do not take BIKTARVY if you also take a medicine that contains:

- dofetilide
- ▶ rifampin

What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking BIKTARVY?

Before taking BIKTARVY, tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- have liver problems, including hepatitis B virus infection
- have kidney problems
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if BIKTARVY can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant during treatment with BIKTARVY.

Pregnancy Registry: There is a pregnancy registry for women who take antiviral medicines during pregnancy. The purpose of this registry is to collect information about the health of you and your baby. Talk with your healthcare provider about how you can take part in this registry.

- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you take BIKTARVY.
 - You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.
 - At least one of the medicines in BIKTARVY can pass to your baby in your breast milk. It is not known if the other medicines in BIKTARVY can pass into your breast milk.

Talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, antacids, laxatives, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Some medicines may interact with BIKTARVY. Keep a list of your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.

- You can ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist for a list of medicines that interact with BIKTARVY.
- ▶ Do not start a new medicine without telling your healthcare provider. Your healthcare provider can tell you if it is safe to take BIKTARVY with other medicines.

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How should I take BIKTARVY®?

- ▶ Take BIKTARVY exactly as your healthcare provider tells you to take it. BIKTARVY is taken by itself (not with other HIV-1 medicines) to treat HIV-1 infection.
- ▶ Take BIKTARVY 1 time each day with or without food.
- Do not change your dose or stop taking BIKTARVY without first talking with your healthcare provider. Stay under a healthcare provider's care during treatment with BIKTARVY.
- If you take antacids that contain aluminum, magnesium, or calcium, take BIKTARVY on an empty stomach 2 hours before you take these antacids.
- If you take supplements that contain iron or calcium, take these supplements with food at the same time that you take BIKTARVY.
- ▶ Do not miss a dose of BIKTARVY.
- If you take too much BIKTARVY, call your healthcare provider or go to the nearest hospital emergency room right away.
- When your BIKTARVY supply starts to run low, get more from your healthcare provider or pharmacy. This is very important because the amount of virus in your blood may increase if the medicine is stopped for even a short time. The virus may develop resistance to BIKTARVY and become harder to treat.

What are the possible side effects of BIKTARVY?

BIKTARVY may cause serious side effects, including:

- ▶ See "What is the most important information I should know about BIKTARVY?"
- ▶ Changes in your immune system (Immune Reconstitution Syndrome) can happen when you start taking HIV-1 medicines. Your immune system may get stronger and begin to fight infections that have been hidden in your body for a long time. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you start having any new symptoms after starting your HIV-1 medicine.
- New or worse kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare provider should do blood and urine tests to check your kidneys when starting and during treatment with BIKTARVY. Your healthcare provider may tell you to stop taking BIKTARVY if you develop new or worse kidney problems.
- ▶ Too much lactic acid in your blood (lactic acidosis). Too much lactic acid is a serious but rare medical emergency that can lead to death. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you get these symptoms: weakness or being more tired than usual, unusual muscle pain, being short of breath or fast breathing, stomach pain with nausea and vomiting, cold or blue hands and feet, feel dizzy or lightheaded, or a fast or abnormal heartbeat.

What are the possible side effects of BIKTARVY? (continued)

▶ Severe liver problems. In rare cases, severe liver problems can happen that can lead to death. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you get these symptoms: skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow, dark "tea-colored" urine, light-colored stools, loss of appetite for several days or longer, nausea, or stomach-area pain.

The most common side effects of BIKTARVY are diarrhea (6%), nausea (5%), and headache (5%).

These are not all the possible side effects of BIKTARVY.

Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to the FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

General information about the safe and effective use of BIKTARVY.

Comcast, Out and Equal host forum on adoption

About 40 people from various organizations attended Comcast's Out and Equal's event, "Ever Thought About Adoption?," on May 16 at 901 W. Weed St, as part of Out and Equal's Citywide Pride Programming.

"We host programs like this that we believe will benefit our LGBTQ employees/OUT members," said Sean Janda-Forner, the co-lead of OUT@ Comcast, the company's LGBTQ ERG. "As a service to the community at large, when we can, we include external LGBTQ organizations and members of LGBTQ ERGs from other companies so that they can benefit from our programs as well."

Janda added that the event, about a year and a half in the making, would ideally give attendees, especially LGBTQ ones, an idea of every side of the process.

Comcast Senior Director of Disability and Absence Scott Daniels introduced a panel of Comcast employees plus an adoption professional as being about the expectations, perceptions, myths that might come along with adoption. Daniels also mentioned that Comcast had wanted to change the culture for new parents, including the presumption of gender neutrality. Comcast benefits now include 12 weeks of paid parental leave

for employees of any gender, and reimbursement for up to \$10,000 of adoption related expenses.

"Those four little people have made everything worthwhile," said Comcast employee Violet Digiovanni, who has adopted four children from foster care, the latter two after her husband unexpectedly passed away.

Janda-Forner, who also took part in the panel, remembered feeling like he and his husband didn't know where to go to start the process and being concerned about how stereotypes about gay men might play into both adoption itself and his future child's potential experiences.

"We had no idea what to expect," said Janda-Forner. "Being a gay couple, how will other people react?"

Janda-Forner and his husband adopted their son back in 2012, about a month after he started at Comcast. He remembered feeling supported by his management at the time: when the opportunity to adopt suddenly arose, his manager immediately gave him two weeks paid leave.

Comcast's Jonathan Huber, adopted at birth, described his adoptive parents as "the most loving parents a child could ask for." In what he called a "talk show moment," Huber was able to reconnect with his birth mother and her family in his 30s. "I have two sets of parents that love

me," Huber said, adding that he never felt different because of being adopted.

Janda-Forner invited Jane Turner, Executive Director of the Illinois Adoption Center, to the panel, as IAC was the agency that helped his family adopted. While Turner helped define different adoption options, she was very open about the "enormous variety" of possibilities when it

came to adoption, including timeframe and cost. Turner defined timeframe possibilities as "quickly to never" and cost from "nothing to \$60,000." Adopting through foster care and DFCS, Turner explained, adoptive parents may even get a subsidy, where private and international adoptions may cost in the tens of thousands of dollars. Yet Turner also added that there are resources for those looking to adopt. "I don't want anyone to say it's too expensive," she said.

Turner said she likes to know the vision prospective families have for their adoption, and she outlined common misconceptions people have about their ability to be adoptive parents, including being single, gay, having student loans, renting vs. owning, on antidepressants, or being in an unmarried couple.

"Most of the barriers are not valid," Turner said, and added that in fact, in the last years, three birth mothers specifically requested same-sex male couples as potential adoptive families, so they could, as Turner put it, "be the only mom."

Both Digiovanni and Janda-Forner described the home visit stage of adoption as "scary," and fraught with potential judgement by outsiders. Janda-Forner also recalled the anxiety he felt between the time his son was born and his adoption was finalized.

"Get ready for an emotional roller-coaster," Janda-Forner said--but, he added, the emotions are not necessarily bad.

And Turner had words for the anxious prospective adoptive parent. "Never feel like you're doing it by yourself," she said.

Size matters at the daddy of all leather competitions with a total of 72 contestants—the largest number on record—competing at International Mr. Leather (IML) 2018 in Chicago, IL, surpassing the previous record of 66 contestants from 2002. IML draws an estimated 18,000 attendees from around the globe who will have a boots-on-the ground presence this year to mark the 40th anniversary of the event.

Those boots will also have the opportunity to receive leather care at the 26th annual International Mr. Bootblack competition, which takes place throughout the IML weekend and features four contestants this year.

IML began as a competition at the Gold Coast, a long-shuttered gay men's leather bar in Chicago owned by iconic businessman and IML founder Chuck Renslow. The contest became so popular it exceeded the pub's capacity, and in 1979, International Mr. Leather was born. Today, IML has evolved into a multiday event featuring fetish workshops, speakers and dance parties, with a Leather Market full of kink wares from chains to chaps.

To honor the enduring heritage of Renslow, who died June 29, 2017 at age 87, an exhibition titled Chuck Renslow: A Legacy of Leather— featuring materials from the Leather Archives & Museum—will be on display during IML, including a guest book for visitors to sign that will be added to the Archives' collection.

"In an age of almost overwhelming sexual oppression, Renslow was a key player in provid-

ing the necessary means for liberation," note Chicago journalists and authors Tracy Baim and Owen Keehnen in the opening pages of Leatherman: The Legend of Chuck Renslow, a biography of Renslow, published in 2011. "Suddenly there wasn't such overwhelming isolation when it came to exploring sexuality and lifestyles beyond hetero and beyond the borders of 'vanilla.' Renslow had an impact on tens of thousands by helping people recognize their sexual desires, their kinks, and their fantasies."

IML organizers also plan to celebrate Renslow's legacy during the IML contest Sunday evening, although program leaders prefer to keep the specific details of the celebration close to the (leather) vest at this point.

"I can't get into specifics, because the person who manages and makes all of the weekend magic happen, our executive director Bill Stadt, asked me not to, but at the contest Sunday evening at the Auditorium Theatre, there will be a very special, and what we believe to be, powerful and poignant moment that underscores who Chuck was and what he meant and continues to mean to every single one of us to this day," said Jon Krongaard, president IML, Inc. Krongaard also noted that IML attendees can expect a large number of past IML winners to help honor Renslow's memory as part of the evening's program.

In addition to recognizing Renslow's leather legacy, organizers also plan to mark IML's 40th anniversary by updating some of the conference's

content and structure. Opening Ceremonies—which include an introduction to this year's judges, a brief preview of contestants' and their number selection to determine their order for appearances throughout the competition—are being moved back out of the host hotel and into the Auditorium Theatre in a format called "Reversing the Room."

"This year, there's a twist," said Krongaard. "All of the attendees at Opening Ceremonies on Thursday evening will join the contestants on stage—they're actually going to be part of the show. Everybody will be on the stage. It's unbelievable. If you've ever been on that stage, even with just the house lights up, and looking out into that venue, then you know it's mind-boggling, bone-chillingly awesome, and nothing less than amazing."

Another notable change this year is a new Friday event called Flashback. In previous years, outgoing IML titleholders have hosted roasts or given "step-aside speeches," but this year, Flashback will give Ralph Bruneau (IML 2017) and Ryan "Pawlish" Garner-Carpenter (International Mr. Bootblack 2017) the opportunity to engage in a Q&A with attendees to describe their experiences of the past year.

"We're trying to make it a little more of an intimate and conversational setting," explained Krongaard. "This format will allow them to talk about their year and share some stories that may or may not have made it onto Facebook. They may even give some final thoughts as they wind down their year. Ralph and Ryan are actually very excited about it."

Other new and notable IML offerings this year include the following: Puppy Yoga (bring your mat!), a warm-up of sorts to the Off Leash: The Pup and the Handler Romp, which has moved to Friday night and features a much bigger space with a carpeted floor; a screening of the 2017 Tom of Finland film on Sunday afternoon, which provides a biographical look at Touko Laaksonen (aka Tom of Finland); Forever Leather, a session on preserving leather (hint: there's more to it than keeping it shiny); and four instructional Kink U sessions once again organized by Titans of the Midwest.

Two of the four Kink U sessions feature traditional topic areas including, Stress Relief through BDSM (stress management through play time) and Leather Through the Lens (panelists discuss



Pimping King

With 2018 being the 50th anniversary of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s assassination, commemorations honoring the man will be taking place across the country. But who would think a Super Bowl ad with a King voiceover would be used to sell pickup trucks?

The pitch for Dodge Ram trucks' "Built To Serve" Volunteer Program did just that and provoked a fast and furious backlash on Twitter and a rebuke from the King Center.

Adding insult to injury, the commercial's narrative arc from beginning to end misappropriates MLK's essential message in his 1968 speech, "The Drum Major Instinct." The speech rails against materialism, using cars as a classic example.

"Do you ever see people buy cars that they can't even begin to buy in terms of their income? You've seen people riding around in Cadillacs and Chryslers who don't earn enough to have a good T-Model Ford," King said in his sermon.

Misrepresentation in commercial advertising involving Blacks, however, is not new. The exploitation of Black talent and the objectification of Black bodies and images to pad the pockets of profit-making

corporations under the guise of helping underserved populations and communities is also not new.

For example, we all remember the 2017 Pepsi commercial fiasco starring Kendall Jenner. The ad preyed on racial and ethnic stereotypes in its attempt to expand the brand to a multicultural consumer base. Also, it misappropriated the iconic and viral photo of Ieshia Evans, the 28-year-old African-American mother who—in 2016, during a Black Lives Matter protest in Baton Rouge, Louisiana—stunned the nation as well as the world when she silently walked to the front line of heavily armed police and offered her hands to be arrested. Jenner, however, with the reenactment of the white hero/rescuer trope, thwarts a possible riot in the commercial simply by offering a white cop a Pepsi.

The Dodge Ram trucks commercial is not so egregious. Ram Nation Volunteer Program's mission is "supposedly" not to sell their trucks but rather to highlight how its "Ram Truck owners are a special breed" serving all of humanity "from disaster relief to blood drives or even just cutting a neighbor's grass." Its webpage uses King's quote "Everybody can be great because everybody can serve" to bolster its claim. Although the ad was-tone deaf in mixing King's speech with its product promotion the Ram Nation Volunteer Program's, it didn't, however, undermine its goals—and that's to sell trucks.

The use of revered dead historical figures to pitch products has become a popular advertising strategy to instantly attract consumers' attention, given their high level of recognition—even if there's a backlash. In a 30-to 60-second television spot during an

event like the Super Bowl (which draws annually one of the largest viewerships in the country), revered dead historical figures make the sale for commercial products because their iconic stature in society and the story behind their images easily resonate with viewers. For example, the 2012 Red Bull commercial mocking Jesus' miracle of walking on water received an outcry from Christians across the country, myself included. The energy-drink maker dropped the ad immediately, but its sales soared nonetheless.

While I find the Dodge Ram truck commercial disrespectful and dangerous in this political era of fake news, alternative facts and revisionist history, the commercialization of King suggests that the money that can be made from King is more important than his message. Sadly, the Ram Dodge Truck ad is not the first time King is repackaged to sell a product. In 2001, King's world-renowned "I Have a Dream" speech was used in print and TV for Alcatel Americas, a telecommunications and networking equipment company. Alcatel wanted to co-opt the speech to give it a Forrest Gump-like spin. Can you imagine?

When it comes to pimping a profit from King's legacy, however, the dilemma is aided by King's youngest son, Dexter. He treats his father's speeches as commercial literary works, charging license fees for their use. Regrettably, Dexter runs the intellectual properties management arm of the King Center, which appears not to distinguish between commercializing King from communicating King to younger and wider audiences. Its aim is for revenue maximization, by any means that presents itself. This time, it was the Dodge Ram truck ad.

Ban on the run

The Honorable James N. Mattis Secretary Department of Defense 1000 Defense Pentagon Washington, DC 20301-1000 Dear Secretary Mattis:

On behalf of the physician and medical student members of the American Medical Association (AMA), I am writing to express our concern about the new policy recently approved by President Trump imposing limits on transgender individuals serving in the military.

This new policy, based on recommendations you made in February to President Trump, states that "transgender persons with a history or diagnosis of gender dysphoria—individuals who the policies state may require substantial medical treatment,

including medications and surgery—are disqualified from military service except under certain limited circumstances" (Presidential Memorandum for the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of Homeland Security Regarding Military Service by Transgender Individuals, May 23, 2018).

We believe there is no medically valid reason—including a diagnosis of gender dysphoria—to exclude transgender individuals from military service. Transgender individuals have served, and continue to serve, our country with honor, and we believe they should be allowed to continue doing so. We share the concerns recently expressed by former Surgeons General M. Joycelyn Elders and David Satcher that the Defense Department's Feb. 22, 2018, memorandum for the President mischaracterized and rejected the wide body of peer-reviewed research on the effectiveness of transgender medical care. This research, demonstrating that medical care for gen-

der dysphoria is effective, was the rationale for the AMA's adoption of policy by our House of Delegates in 2015, that there is no medically valid reason to exclude transgender individuals from military service.

The AMA also supports public and private health insurance coverage for treatment of gender dysphoria as recommended by the patient's physician. We support the finding of the RAND study conducted for the Department of Defense on the impact of transgender individuals in the military that the financial cost is negligible and a rounding error in the defense budget. It should not be used as a reason to deny patriotic Americans an opportunity to serve their country. We should be honoring their service.

'China Shop' looks at influential lesbian couple

Imagine this: You're at the top of your class. You're off to an Ivy League college, thrilled \at the seemingly limitless intellectual pursuits you can follow. And then you're told that since you're a girl, classes in folding laundry and baking are mandatory. Because everyone knows two things for sure: Rigorous intellectual pursuits are damaging to a woman's precious femininity. Also, your primary goal in life is to get an MRS degree. And, it goes without saying, spawn babies.

Such was the state of higher education if you were a woman lucky enough to attend college in 1900, when Mary Woolley became president ofthe Ivy League's Mount Holyoke College. Flash forwards a century or so. Women who made it through a higher-ed degree program without having to waste hours learning how to properly use a shrimp fork or remove blood stains from petticoats have Mary Woolley to thank. Never heard of her? Not surprising.

"So much queer history and women's history has been forgotten or just never told," said Kelli Simpkins, who plays Woolley in About Face Theatre's upcoming Bull in a China Shop. Opening in previews Thursday, May 24, Bryna Turner's 90-minute dramatic comedy puts the high beams on Woolley and her partner of some 50 years, Jeanette Marks.

It's not hyperbole to say that Woolley changed the entire model of higher education for women. Both Woolley and Marks were also staunch suffragettes, peace activists and social justice warriors in a time when activism meant far more than all-caps clamoring on social media. For director Keira Fromm,you can draw a clear parallel between the early 20th-century issues within Bull in a China Shop and the state of the world for women today.

"It's no secret that womens' rights are being subverted today, under the current [White House] administration," Fromm said. "And it's no secret that so much of our queer history has been lost. This play takes some of it back. It challenges the white male narrative that dominates history. It's about queer history, and taking ownership of it, and giving it voice."

Even a terse bullet-point list of Marks' and Woolley's accomplishments would fill a book. Woolley was the first woman to be admitted to Brown University. As president of the venerable Mount Holyoke College from 1900 to 1937, she fought with an all-male board of trustees to shut down the classes in handkerchief laundering and reworked the curricula to give women access to a dazzling array of courses in the arts and sciences.

"Basically she changed Mount Holyoke from a finishing school to a true institution of higher learning for women," Fromm said.

Woolley also was vice president of the thenfledgling ACLU, and a crucial voice in creating the League of Nations. She helped lay the framework for the establishment of the NAACP, she advised two presidents (Hoover and Franklin Roosevelt) on pacifism and women's rights. Through it all, she and Marks lived and worked side by side, with Marks (played at About face by Emjoy Gavino) heading up the theater department at Mount Holyoke. "Mary Woolley was, like, 'Look: A woman is capable of much more than just being a help mate," Fromm said. "She argued that education wasn't detrimental to women. It was their right to pursue academia as much as it was for a man. That was absolutely radical," Fromm said.

So why haven't most of us ever heard of Marks and Woolley?

"I think it's partly the patriarchy. And homophobia. And misogyny and sexism," said Simpkins. "Now we're at the point where people of color and queer people and women—all are demanding that their history be included in the history books

Simpkins—as anyone who has been in Chicago's "theatrosphere" for more than a minute knows—is no stranger to dramas that queer the narrative and reclaim history while also being intensely entertaining. A veteran of 11 years in Chicago preceded by 15 years in New York City working with Tectonic Theatre Company and LC3 (Lincoln Center's new works wing), Simpkins has created many an indelible feminist on stage, from the hyper-articulate, take-no-bull attorney of Steppenwolf's Fair Use to a laconic Wild West

explorer of American Theater Company's Men in Boats. However, Woolley will be Simpkins' first time onstage in a corset. ("Fortunately, I get to take it off in the second half," she said.)

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With Bull in a China Shop, she adds another smart, strong wickedly funny woman to her resume. "Mary was described as an effervescent optimist," said Simpkins. "You read her letters and you find them full of poetry and hope and brilliance and joy. She believed in a future for women that was golden and bright.

"When I think of what she did and look at the shit show that is the Trump administration—which is trying to take away everything she accomplished—I see a silver lining," Simpkins added. "The bright spot is that people are finding their footing and finding their voices and creating resistance. Woolley showed how it's possible to change even in the midst of turmoil. She showed what we as queer voices can bring to the

A New Attitude: In Tribute to Patti LaBelle

Patti LaBelle is known for many things: the hit song "Lady Marmalade," kicking off her shoes, her epic rendition of the ABC's on Sesame Street and, most recently, her signature pies.

It's hard to believe this septuagenarian superstar was once a shy, anxious girl from Philadelphia whose mother bribed her to play outside. Black Ensemble Theater productions are always a rollicking good time, full of flashy costumes, fantastic music and stunning voices. Although it's about half an hour too long, A New Attitude: In Tribute to Patti LaBelle fits right into the Black Ensemble Theater canon, with a phenomenal house band and two stellar leading ladies (Dawn Bless and Cherise Thomas) sharing the role of LaBelle herself.

Perfectly capturing Patti's love of sparkle, undulating arm movements and gravity-defying vocals, Bless and Thomas take us through the ups and downs of the legendary singer's life. Her father chose gambling over his family, leaving young Patti devastated, until respite arrived in the form of church choir. Knowing she had a God-given gift, LaBelle pursued management as a teenager, but had to win over record producers who thought she was "too dark and plain" to sell records. Later, she faced racism while touring in the South, broke off an engagement with The Temptations' Otis Williams (Christopher Taylor) and initially resisted a more sexual, political sound for her group, LaBelle. Even when she established an acclaimed solo career and married the ever-loyal Armstead (Treguon Tate), life was never completely smooth. Still, LaBelle revels in her well-earned triumph, using her powerful voice for all it's worth.

A New Attitude writer-director Rueben D. Echoles knows how to captivate an audience, interspersing scenes from Patti's life with phenomenal renditions of her hits, such as her glorious cover of "Over the Rainbow" and "On My Own", her hit duet with Michael McDonald (Mark Yacullo). Echoles also designed the show's costumes, resulting in a visual feast of feathered headdresses, sequined evening gowns and vibrant colors. (It's hard to believe Patti wouldn't enthusiastically approve.) A four-piece onstage band, featuring musical director/arranger Robert Reddrick on drums is one of the strongest I've ever heard, supplementing Bless and Thomas' angelic voices to create a full, rich sound that inspires clapping, cheering and dancing.

Though the production boasts a wonderful ensemble, most playing multiple roles, Bless and Thomas carry the show. As younger Patti (known as Patsy until she started singing professionally), Thomas radiates sass and vulnerability in equal measure, with an incredible vocal range that carries to the back row of the mezzanine. Bless' commanding presence and take-no-prisoners attitude dares the audience to look away, and her voice is, in a word, awe-inspiring. A New Attitude is a fun evening for hard-core fans and Patti newbies alike, a fitting tribute to a true diva who never stops shining bright.

Buried Child

Buried Child, the surreal Pulitzer Prize-winning drama by Sam Shepard, is a difficult play to watch—not because so much is happening, but because so little is happening.

This one is a slow burn: We are introduced to the world's most dysfunctional family meticulous-

ly, over the course of the first two acts. The characters are developed deliberately; it takes time to get to know them. Director Kimberly Senior's languid pace helps to give them the chance to grow as it helps the audience to assimilate into Shepard's story of an Illinois farm home broken by time, bad luck, modernization and secrets.

The pace is established in the first scene, before there is even any dialogue, as Larry Yando (as the patriarch, Dodge) sits on his couch watching television with the sound off, occasionally taking a drink from a hidden bottle or falling into a coughing fit; if he once was industrious and energetic, he no longer is anything but a carcass waiting to be. Dodge is practically inert, yet Yando is almost always the center of attention. It is a masterful acting job, yet it is easily complemented by the other performances

in the play. Shannon Cochran (as Halie, Dodge's wife), manages to establish her character in a scene in which she is entirely offstage. The two broken sons, one emotionally and one physically, present different problems for the actors (Mark L. Montgomery as the childlike Tilden and Timothy Edward Kane as the one-legged Bradley), but both men are up for the challenge. Shane Kenyon and Arti Ishak make second-act appearances as Tilden's son and his girlfriend and each has powerful emotional moments. And there is also a morally compromised preacher, played by Allen Gilmore, who is having an affair with Halie.

Dodge has become what he now is due to the breakdown of his farm and his family. Several times he mentions that he has not planted since 1935, but it's easy to sense that the rise of the farming industry has a lot to do with his life fall-

ing into the sere. As the farm deteriorated over time, so too his family has fallen apart. Halie now spends all of her time upstairs, away from her husband. His favorite son, Ansel, is dead, the other two are shells, and Dodge has become so disinterested in life that, when his grandson shows up unexpectedly, he can't even recall having one.

Senior pulls outstanding performances from her cast as she highlights an American Dream that has fallen apart at the seams. The family's secret is devastating, but one gets the feeling that this family would have been doomed with or without it. Shepard has the audience often laughing at them, but he shows us the utter dissolution of one family's expectations. It's a difficult play to love, but a masterful piece of writing. Buried Child is infrequently revived due to its difficulty, but Senior and her cast are up to the task and make this a powerful, memorable experience.

Mind Reader

Mentalism—more commonly called "mind-reading"—may be the most invasive of the bamboozle-based arts. Sleight-of-hand locates its unknown factors securely within the objects undergoing manipulation (a person who disappears from inside a box, for example, is understood to accomplish this feat exclusively in that particular box). Clairvoyant sightings occupy a milieu safely distanced by time, past or future. The prospect of the last boundary protecting your individual privacy dissolving into a portal

facilitating disclosure of its secrets, though—now *that's* disturbing.

Our first glimpse of Mark Toland dispels all preconceived images of extrasensory-empowered oracles, however. Not only does our Kansas-born soothsayer pair brown shoes with a blue suit, but he wears *glasses*—an accessory invoking 1920s-vintage gags involving myopic fortune tellers. Furthermore, only minutes into the show, he reveals to us precisely how the illusion of psychic superpowers is implemented, recounting the story of his own encounter at the airport with a stranger demonstrating a remarkable familiarity with his most intimate personal data—having previously overheard him phoning his wife before reciting his vitals to the car-rental agent.

Having thus disarmed us with his transparency, Toland then proceeds to retrieve dispatches from our consciousness of a provenance so remote as to banish any explanation of its origins lying in simple eavesdropping—the name of your childhood crush, for example, or the astrological sign you haven't tried to remember

since surrendering it to your dance partner at Broadway Sam's circa 1974.

To be sure, spectators in attendance on opening night encompassed a few volunteers already well-versed in their duties, eagerly offering information more than sufficient for its intended purpose, but their enthusiasm only served to reinforce the nervous-nerd persona adopted by Toland as he struggles with duct-tape blindfolds adhering to facial hair, marking pens wafting aromatic fumes and overly shy assistants vocalizing in whispers. ("Speak up—I'm not really a mind-reader.")

Stage-magic repertoire being finite and a measure of overlap inevitable, our winsome host cannot be faulted for a few of us having seen some of his maneuvers performed elsewhere. In an age when no one is wholly certain of wayward coins and cards ceasing to misbehave after being returned to our custody, the reassurance offered by this weeknight neighborhood entertainment is enough to ensure its welcome.

Buddy, American Blues Theater at Stage 773, through May 26. Far more concert than story, the short, mostly sweet life of Buddy Holly features 16 rocking vocal and instrumental stars. JA

Having Our Say

My mother always said that there is a lot we can learn from our elders, and an evening spent with "the Delany Sisters," a pair of centenarians whose life story is the subject of Having Our Say: The Delany Sisters' First 100 Years, now at the Goodman Theatre, certainly illustrates the point. Ella Joyce and Marie Thomas play Bessie and Sadie Delany, respectively, two sisters who tell of their century as Black women in America.

Framed as the gregarious sisters visiting with a new friend (Bessie speaks of how bored she gets talking to people she's known forever—at least the ones who are still alive), the play spends time with them just chatting in their Mount Vernon living room as well as preparing a meal in their kitchen: normal activities that, we can easily imagine, fill their days. But it is the substance of the conversation that attracted director Chuck Smith to the project, the stories of life in the post-Civil War days and the memories of life in the Jazz Age and under Jim Crow. Though these women were, by their own admission, exceptionally lucky for African-Americans in the 20th century, spending a couple of hours with the Delanys is like getting a lesson on Black history from the most personal teachers in the world.

Joyce and Thomas are perfect as the sisters. Their every interaction renders the idea that they have known each other for a century entirely believable. They finish each other's sentences. They pass narratives off so easily that you know they have told these stories a billion times. They instinctively comfort each other as they need it. But these are not merely interchangeable parts. Joyce, as Bessie, is taller and built solidly. She moves and speaks deliberately and slowly, whereas the more wiry Thomas throws her whole body into her movement and all of her energy into her narratives. They are both remarkable performanc-

Remarkable, too, is Linda Buchanan's set, which takes full advantage of the Goodman's turntable and features picture frames and projected images by Mike Tutaj of the sisters' family photos and films and stills from the eras of which they speak. All aspects of this show shine, but that doesn't go far enough. SMith has made the show into an entirely personal experience, far more like visiting with a couple of favorite aunts than watching a play at all. From the start, when the sisters invite us into their home and their lives, to the end, when they say good night to us as if we were good friends, Smith has crafted a remarkably intimate production on the Albert stage. The two women led fulfilling, impressive lives, and in Having Our Say we get to share their century of life, if only for two hours. My mother would say that it's two hours very well spent, and I'd agree with her. If you've never had the pleasure of getting to know the Delanys, don't miss this opportunity.

SPOTLIGHT

You won't see any reviews of Anu Bhatt's emotionally gripping one-woman show Hollow/ Wave. But you will get a harrowing and ultimately triumphant 90-minute deep dive into her struggles and ultimate triumph. As a woman of Southeast Asian descent and a longtime student of dance, she combines movement, poetry and humor with her sometimes harrowing narrative. Directed by lesbian Barbara Zahora, Hollow/Wave isn't here for long; put it at the top of your list. It's June 10 at Silk Road Rising, Pierce Hall at the Chicago Temple, 77 W.





Lesbian comic and Windy City Times 30 Under 30 alum Cameron Esposito returned to Chicago for two weeks at the end of March, performing 14 shows at the Den Theatre.

Esposito was here working on new material and said the smaller venue and Chicago audience was the perfect setting to test out the more personal material she's been developing, which includes the topics of sexual assault and sex education.

"I'm working on a new hour and usually when I've done that in the past it's meant going on a giant tour in as many cities as possible over eight months, but this material is very personal, so I've decided to try and do it in a different way," she said.

As women across the country join the #MeToo movement by sharing their personal experiences, Esposito said it was important for her to do so

as well. Her new material includes discussing her own experience of sexual assault while in college.

"It feels important right now to talk about my history with sexual assault," she said. "This is a topic that has been in the news for the last year. To me it feels like comedy is a great place to deal with any topic that actually creates harm and trauma. I think that is what humor is for, but what I usually see is standup that has thrown out the idea of assault but not talked about the realities of assault or even the people involved."

Esposito said taking this more personal approach will hopefully help create a greater sense of immediacy and a stronger understanding of what victims experience.

"If I start talking about it maybe other folks will too, and talking about it in this way, from the perspective of a survivor," she said.

Esposito is also taking on the topic of sex education in the United States—or rather the lack,

thereof. Using her Catholic school upbringing as a springboard for the topic, Esposito discussed the fact that even public school children aren't provided with much useful information.

"The spectrum is nothing to [putting a condom on] a banana—that's it," she said.

For the tour, Esposito is drawing on her unique experiences in an effort to actually connect to the universal experience. "I'm trying to move individual experience into the larger experience that we all share," she said. "So, my cultural background is Catholicism, but sub in your own, that is what I want.

"I think the specificity of my experience is actually pretty universal. I didn't have sex ed because I went to Catholic school, but it turns out we don't offer sex ed in this country. Sex ed is not something that is part of anyone's education. ... The most you get is the condom on a banana, that is someone who has had a lot of sex ed."

Esposito said while the shows pretty much went as expected, being in Chicago for two weeks gave her a chance to connect with the city's upand-coming comics. She booked 14 local comics (one for each night) as openers.

"I'm from Chicago and it's where I started doing standup, but usually when I come to town I hang out with my family or I go do the one night of shows. I don't really hang out in the scene. So it was really cool to connect for the first time with folks that are a couple of generations below me that I don't know at all and hear what material they are doing."

She was also impressed with the growing diversity, having started standup when the Chicago comedy scene was limited to only a few queer

and female comics.

"There are so many queer folks and that was awesome, because that was my goal working in Chicago, to try to effect the scene," she said. "And a lot of those folks started through a stand-up class I created in Chicago called the Feminine Comique, and a lot of them started at Cole's Bar, where I had an open mic and where I met Rhea (Butcher)"

Esposito said her audience has also changed substantially as she's garnered more accolades and recognition nationally. Where once she played to rooms of mostly straight people, her audiences today lean LGBTQ, which she said brings it's own set of challenges.

"Maria Bamford talked about this before, once you start drawing your own audience it's very interesting. Before you had to convince people to be on your side, but now people come in and they know your viewpoint, and so you are trying to up your game to continue to entertain and surprise and present new information.

"When you are someone's favorite band, you can play their favorite song and it can be like a greatest hits and the audience will be jazzed; when you are somebody's favorite comic, it should be the exact opposite experience. You should be on the message they vaguely know you to be, but blowing their minds with the new shit, but it's hard to do that."

Esposito is currently taking her set to the East Coast, but people can catch new episodes of her podcast, "Queery," every week throughout the summer. Seasons one and two of Take my Wife, Esposito's show with wife Rhea Butcher, are also available on iTunes.



BOOK REVIEW

What You Want To See By Kristen Lepionka \$25.99; Minotaur; 336 pages REVIEW BY LIZ BAUDLER

Kristen Lepionka writes a trying-to-be hard-boiled yet oh-so-relatable bisexual PI in the Roxane Weary mysteries, of which What You Want To See is the second. Roxane's tropes are going with her gut and sexually/romantically jockeying between the very solid, nice and unavailable cop Tom Heitker and the wild artist and slightly bitchy tease Catherine Walsh. Oh—and there's a bachelorette apartment complete with an empty refrigerator and quickly emptying bottles of Crown Royal.

Mere days after he contracts Roxane to follow his possibly deceitful fiance, Arthur Ungless is accused of murdering her. The detective's instinct Roxane inherited from her late police detective father says despite the suspicious circumstances—they were seen arguing at dinner—Arthur didn't kill her. But the fiance, Marin, is a enigmatic woman with little in the way of a paper trail. And the cops just want Roxane to stop prying. And soon, a car will get wrecked and a lot of people will get shot. So it's got all the elements of a thriller in place, and Lepionka's voice is gritty and nimble and funny where it needs to be. Whether it's the details of the peanut butter,



carrot and sriracha sandwich on bread that might be about to go stale, or the portrait of gentifying Columbus, Ohio, that forms the backdrop to crime and intrigue, it's a delightfully recognizable world-Roxane Weary inhabits.

While What You Want to See will definitely stand on its own, it's even better when paired

with its progenitor, The Last Place You Look, in which we get to meet the cast of characters that will bolster Roxane or lift her out of the scrapes an often-broke, headstrong lady private detective might find herself in. In that book, we meet Shelby, a teenager whose gueer identity is starting to blossom, and the scene in which Roxane realizes Shelby's yearning for her missing best friend is one of the more touching realizations of identity ever written—particularly in a book of this genre. In What You Want to See, Shelby's trying to move out from under her overprotective's father's eye and is prepared to do it: she has the life management skills of a working 35-year-old mother of three. Another strong point in Lepionka's narratives is the interplay of family dynamics, whether between Shelby and her father, or in revealing the gaping hole Roxane's father left in their own family when he died, to the point where Roxane's mother hasn't opened his study in nearly a year, and how Roxane's very different siblings handle her grief.

Overall, even if the plot ratchets exponentially at the last minute, the quality of creation far exceeds the average dime-store crime novel. Throw in the bisexual angle—which is done perhaps a smidge predictably but definitely not artificially—and you've got one hell of an appealing beach read. The only slight flaw is that What You Want To See, by dint of its being second in the list, cannot equal the magic The Last Place You Look casts, as it introduces all of its appealing,

SAVOR The Florentine; Cafe Robey

Sure, it's good to sometimes shake up things—but consistency can be a good thing as well.

Example one is **The Florentine** (in the J.W. Marriott Hotel, 151 W. Adams St.; https://the-florentine.net/). It's still warm and welcoming—and the quality of the dishes is still quite high.

Chef Zachary Walrath recently unveiled the menu for spring/midsummer (three menu alterations annually instead of four), with many dishes changed to reflect fruits and vegetables that are currently in season.

Regarding antipasti, it's hard to go wrong with the burrata di campana, which features creamfilled mozzarella, peperonata, olives, capers, basil and polenta bread (the latter courtesy of a new bakery); and polpo (octopus with saffron aioli, butter beans, snow peas, nduja and salsa verde).

An enticing insalata di carciofi incorporates

baby artichokes, golden raisins, currants, marcona almonds, lemon and parmesan. A favorite dish, bucatini carbonara, has the requisite ingredients (pancetta, sweet peas, pecorino, egg yolk and black pepper) done in a most pristine manner. Lastly, lamb chops (or agnello) are sizeable and tasty, accompanied with charred eggplant, ceci beans, peperonata and mint.

And, if you have the room, don't miss out on dessert. The crostata (warm apple pie with bourbon gelato) is divine, but there are other options, including bomboloni (warm ricotta doughnuts with Nutella and cinnamon), strawberry mousse and panna cotta.

Also, The Florentine still has an exhaustive drink menu that could be a nightmare for indecisive people. Specialty cocktails (\$16 each) include items such as The Wayfarer and The Turn of the Tide. (As last look, these items were not in the online drink menu, which would present a problem for those who like to plan ahead.)

There is one major difference now, though: Sommelier Alexandria Sarovich is no longer there, having moved half a world away to Australia. Fidelma Cunniffe (who's here by way of Dublin, Ireland) is the new beverage director.

Cafe Robey

The second example of desired consistency (incidentally, connected to a hotel as well) involves the quality of the dishes at **Cafe Robey** (in The Robey hotel, at 1616 N. Milwaukee Ave.; https://www.therobey.com/), which, too, has an updated seasonal menu.

The spot's offerings (some which are "deconstructed") can best be described as contemporary American, with a global twist. One of the "small" dishes (the category printed on the menu) is simply called "Grains," and it sports a Middle Eastern flair; it consists of the ancient grain bulgur as well as cucumber, roasted peppers and onions, watermelon radish and avocado mousse, and it's accompanied with sesame lavash and sumac vinaigrette.

The Japanese-inspired egg dish simply called "Egg" (one of my faves) has a five-minute egg as well as blackened aspargus, basil custard, miso butter, chicken battarga and bonito flakes. The

pork-belly appetizer has a Mexican influence, as the braised meat has elements such as mole and charred pineapple gel and corn fritters, along with spiced cabbage and pickled radishes.


The main dishes are just as complex—and, thankfully, tasty. The pan-roasted lamb chops come with snap pea-and-mint puree, roasted carrots, black rice and aleppo vinaigrette. Pork loin is coffee-crusted, and comes with lentils, pork-and-lentil empanadas, chimichurri, kale salad and fresh radish. (Other entrees cover a wide variety of proteins, such as chicken, duck, cod, beef and salmon, although the browned potato gnocchi is one of the best pasta dishes I've had in a while.)

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


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
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
